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Especially should this be true if he can feel that he has been of real service to his government during his term of office. Those retiring this year can easily have this satisfaction, for never before has the city been in better condition than it now is. Those who have just retired have served during the period of greatest progress in city affairs, and have had a part in that progress.

During the terms of one or all of them the water line has been extended in the national forests without expense to the city, thanks to the original idea of the council in asking the government to bear the expense; a million-gallon water reservoir has been constructed, and not in several years has there been danger of a shortage of water; a water line has been extended to the industrial district that is responsible at this moment for the employment of at least half of the 300 men being given part time jobs as a result of the activities of the Standard Sealing society, and mill properties that give employment under ordinary conditions to from 500 to 700 men are secure from any disastrous fire, with prospects for other industries in the future along the same line; a beautiful city hall has been built, the water distribution system has been made a workable one; water department firms have been put upon a firm basis; the city has been given ornamental lights; Main street has been widened; the greater proportion of street improvements of the city have been made during that time; a gas system has been started; the city's records have been put into business-like condition; the war-rant indebtedness has been materially decreased; all of the city's obligations have been met promptly; the city has secured a magnificent armory building, and there probably are other things worthy of mention, such as extensions of the sewer system, etc. Those now retiring from the council have much to look backward to with satisfaction, and the same may be said of others who have retired in previous years.
