HIGH SCHOOL MAY ENTER STATE DRAMA TOURNAMENT

The Cottage Grove high school has made application for entry in the fifth annual drama tournament to be held April 2, 3, and 4 at University of Oregon. The tournament provides that ten leading schools of the state will compete and those first to file will be eligible. Those competing will present one-act plays of about 35 minutes duration. The play may be either a comedy or one of a more serious type.

If Cottage Grove high is eligible members of the dramatics class will present a play, "The Trysting Place," by Booth Tarkington. The class has spent considerable time and effort on the play. It will be presented January 29 at the local gymnasium. This is only the second year that dramatics has been a course in the local school and it is the first year the school has made application to the state drama tournament.

SURVEY ON TUBERCULOSIS PLANNED FOR SCHOOL HERE

Dr. S. M. Kerron, county health officer, and Miss Beattie Williams, county health nurse, were visitors in the Cottage Grove schools Tuesday in the interests of a county survey of tuberculosis in which tuberculin tests are to be given in various schools.

Dr. Kerron spoke to high school students and explained the purpose of the clinic and the follow-up system. Slips will be given students next week to obtain the parents' consent to the tests. The clinic will consist of two or three tests to determine whether the tuberculin germ is present in the system. When symptoms are indicated students may have X-ray pictures taken at a nominal charge. The tests are free. Provisions have been made in the county survey whereby early methods of treatment will be prescribed and the students instructed in preventive precaution as well.

"White House" Properly Is "Executive Mansion"
The home of the President of the United States is the Executive Mansion, but it has been called the White House for a great many years. Theodore Roosevelt was the first President to have the name the White House substituted for the Executive Mansion on stationery and documents issued from the President's headquarters.

The building was originally constructed of Virginia freestone, grayish in color. When it was restored after the fire of 1814 the walls were painted white to cover up the blackened parts, and it came to be called the White House. It has been painted white ever since. George Washington favored the name, "the Palace of the President," but most people at first called it simply "the President's House." James Fenimore Cooper liked that name, too.
