**Keeney Protests Against Bill.**

Ben F. Keeney, county assessor, has sent letters of protest to state legislators against house bill No. 124, which provides cancellation of tax liens on property acquired by the state through mortgage foreclosure or other settlement of indebtedness. Mr. Keeney claimed by passage of the bill an injustice would be worked on counties, cities, school districts and other tax levying districts by depriving them of taxes in some districts for a certain period. In his letter Mr. Keeney also accused the war veterans state aid commission of indiscreetly making bonus loans to ex-service men, which resulted in frequent mortgage foreclosure on the part of the state.
