be members with previous experience. The idea is good, but what if there should be no such member? And here is something that could happen that might be worse: Suppose the only two members in both houses were residents of Lane county. Wouldn't it be a pretty how-do-you-do for one county to have four members on that great committee? What would the state college people have to say with four men from the university county on this committee? Or suppose Multnomah county should get four members? Wouldn't the rest of the state howl about how Portland was hogging things?

The legislature adjourned at a few minutes after 1 o'clock a. m. Friday last. There is little doubt that everyone is glad that the session is over, but the reasons for the jubilation are various and some are at variance with others.

Governor Meier was in much better repute at the end of the session than at its beginning, and many of those who had bitterly opposed his election were predicting that he would make an outstanding governor and would be able to accomplish much for the state.

The hydrophobics are happy because the entire hydro-electric program was enacted in one law. The governor is happy because he got everything he asked for. The great majority are happy because the legislature are a bunch of crooks who spent 53 days fooling away the people's money while passing foolish and idiotic laws. This great majority feels that there should never be a legislative session, that we have laws enough.

But finally a number of bills began to arrive in the governor's office. The bill that didn't have a chance went through with votes to throw away, and the chief executive's approving signature was attached to pet bills.

The Sentinel will deal first with this last named class. The personnel of the recent legislature was the highest that this writer has ever known, and he has been attending sessions since 1915. The fellow who would pay for votes would have had a hard time finding anyone he would dare offer it to. This doesn't mean that members weren't influenced. Of course they were, they were influenced by friendships, they were influenced by the arguments of lobbyists, they were influenced by persons and organizations at home, they were influenced by the governor, they may have been influenced by a senior senator in their own affairs, but this writer doubts whether a single member was influenced by money, and this opinion is borne out by newspaper writers, lobbyists and others who were present during the session.

A noticeable thing was a lack of forceful leadership, outstanding leadership. It occurs to this writer that the high character of the membership may have been responsible for this apparent lack of leadership. Men of the character of those who made up both houses are men who think and act for themselves. There was not such a difference in their ability that any stood out head and shoulders above others. If the two houses had been made up of 90 per cent dumbbells, there would have been leaders.

Among men such as these 53 days were not sufficient for the development of outstanding leadership. Whatever the legislature did or did not do, it did as good a job, or a better job, than its critics would have done.

At least that's the way the story went. And those who visited the inner sanctum came away with genuinely more friendly feeling toward the governor.

There are always those who say we should have no legislative sessions, that we already have laws enough. In this connection it is well to note that each legislative session passes fewer laws than the preceding session. It should also be borne in mind that the greater number of bills add no new laws, being merely amendatory of laws we already have. Without making a check this writer would say that not over 10 per cent of legislation enacted adds any new subject to the statutes.

Here's something worth considering by those who believe we have no need for legislative sessions: In every session for a number of years Cottage Grove has been very interested in certain legislation. For several sessions an army appropriation was put through both houses. A bill of the past session that was of vital importance to Cottage Grove was an amendment to the so-called Wheeler or county tuition law that had been advocated by everyone in the Cottage Grove school district who was familiar with school affairs.

Every other community may have been equally as vitally interested in some other legislation. The point is that the larger part of legislation is proposed by persons outside the legislature who believe such legislation necessary to their welfare and prosperity. And it is proposed by those who have no reason to be ashamed for having proposed it.
