Cottage Grove Defeats Roseburg in Track Meet

Locals Win 52% to 51% Victory in Dual Contest; Guggisberg Scores 20 1/2.

By the narrow margin of one point the Cottage Grove high school track team nosed out Roseburg in a hotly contested dual track meet Saturday forenoon in Roseburg. The final score was 52% to 51%. Roseburg was ahead four points before the 880 relay, the final event, was run. Cottage Grove came through to win the relay, score five points and win the meet. This was the first dual track meet the high school had ever entered.

Ernest Guggisberg, crack miler on the local team, was high point man of the meet with 20 1/2 points. G. Palm of Roseburg was second with 15 points and Virgil Horn of Cottage Grove was third with 14 1/2.

In the 880 yard run Guggisberg came from behind in a fast finish to nose out Schmidt of Roseburg. A feature of the 440 race was the battle between Schmidt of Roseburg and Ballew of Cottage Grove, the Roseburg runner finally edging out Ballew.
