Cottage Grove Is Close To Being on Cash Basis

The financial condition of the city continues to improve. The treasurer has called all street and sewer warrants and general fund warrants have been called up to No. 5690, issued November 6, 1930; all water fund warrants have been called to No. 3269, issued April 14, this year, and all bond and warrant fund warrants have been called to No. 78, issued May 1, this year. The call was issued following receipt from the county of a large payment of tax funds.

The city has been gradually reducing its warrant indebtedness for a number of years and it is expected that the present year will put the city nearer to a cash basis than it has been since pioneer days.

Flying Squadron Seen Over Silk Creek

SILK CREEK, June 16. — (Special.)—About 40 airplanes, one of the U. S. army pursuit squadrons that visited Portland last week, flew over Silk creek Friday on their way south. The combined drone of their motors drew a large number outside to watch the flight. The squadron was in formation and made a remarkable picture against the sky. 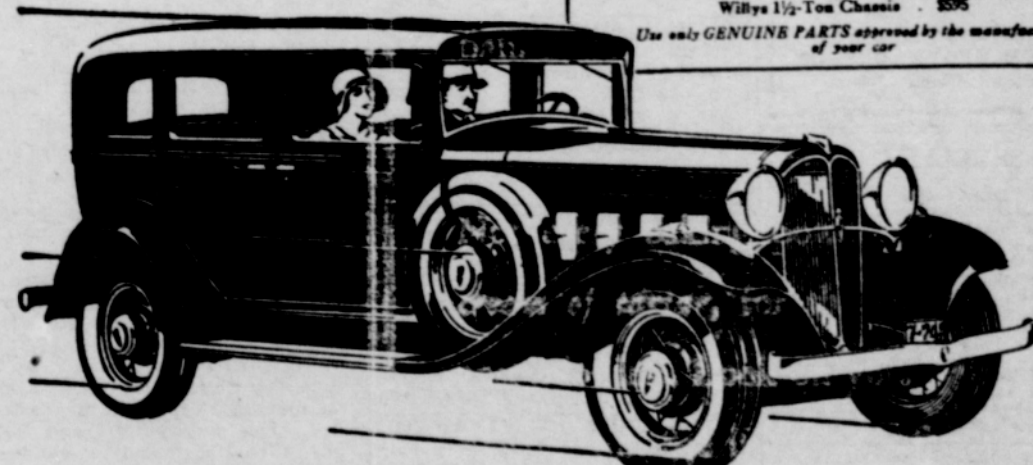
