Low Prices Result In Much Improvement Work

Half Thousand Vehicles Pass in Three Hours

Amount of Highway Traffic Indicated When Construction Holds Up Line.

LATHAM, July 8.—(Special.)—During a three-hour period between 1 and 4 o'clock Wednesday of last week, 538 cars passed the Bushnell home here, according to a check made by Edith Bushnell. Of this number 298 were south bound and 240 north bound. This check did not include cars used by highway construction crews working in the vicinity.

The amount of traffic Pacific highway carries was indicated when traffic was halted by highway construction work Saturday and Monday. The delay seldom last more than 15 minutes, but one time 78 northbound and 39 southbound cars were in line and at another time 44 northbound and 42 southbound cars were held up.

LATHAM, July 8.—(Special.)—Millions of worms are reported to have eaten all the leaves from 15 to 20 acres of greasewood brush on the M. H. Anderson ranch. Consolidation of Voting Precincts Is Considered

Several Are Renamed So That Names Will Indicate Geography of Location.

Revision of Lane county voting precincts to reduce the cost of elections and otherwise bring efficiency into the ballot casting system is the object of a program mapped out Tuesday by the Lane county court and County Clerk W. B. Dillard.

The court went over the entire precinct list, studying possible consolidations where small precincts are close together, and also considering change of names of precincts to indicate more definitely their location.

Election costs at the last election, Mr. Dillard reported to the court, varied from \$4.27 a vote in the Five Rivers precinct to 19 cents a vote in three of the Eugene city precincts. This spread of cost indicates something may be done to eliminate some of the expense of

voting in the small precincts. Where geographical conditions permit there may be consolidations. A new law specifying the limit on size of precincts may facilitate the revision work. The old law limited each precinct to 300 registered voters, while the new ruling is that no more than 500 voters may be cast in any one precinct.

There are 129 precincts in Lane county, 37 being in Eugene. At the last election 12,589 ballots were cast, and the total cost of the election was \$5,268.32.

In this end of the county Siuslaw precinct has been changed to Lorne and Wallace precinct to London.

Two small Lane county mills will resume operations the first of next week. Shutting down of larger operations had a tendency to influence the small mills to start up, it is reported.

The mills to start next week are the Briggs plant at Triangle lake and the Evans mill at Noti.

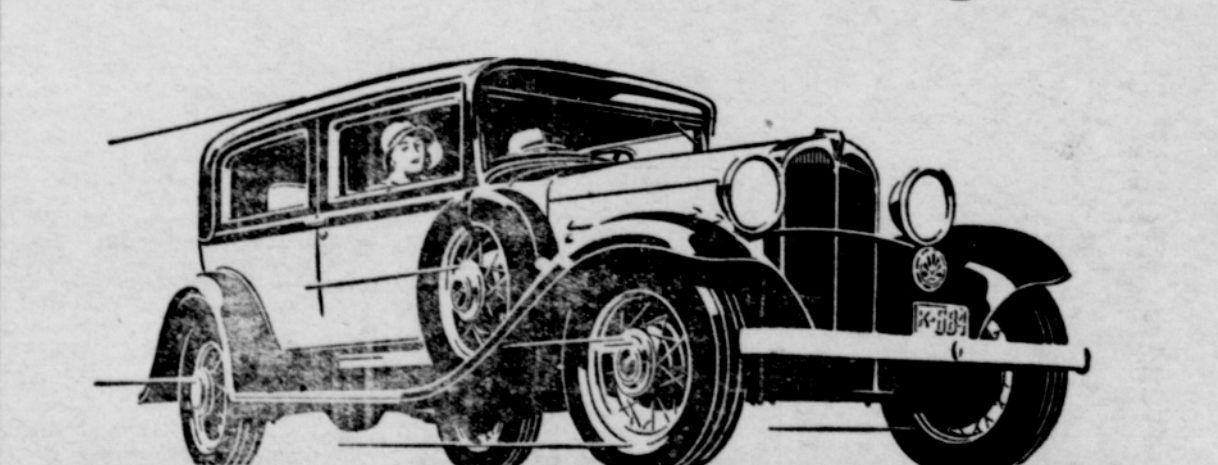
