to the forests, and a pretty lawn has been planted around the homes of the ranger and his assistant. Mrs. Pieper keeps up a splendid garden, is rearing a splendid family, and is a good cook. Pater Pieper merely looks on.

The operator of the caterpillar at the road camp on the Brice creek road had an amusing experience a few days ago. Some visitors saw him pumping grease into some part of the machine. His grease tube appeared to enter the track on one side of the machine. "What is he doing?" asked one visitor of another. "He's pumping up his tires," was the serious answer given by one who wished to show his knowledge. There is always one like that in every group of visitors.

In employing his assistants Ranger Pieper gives preference to local men and boys, especially boys working their way through college. Among those I remember seeing were Alta Kelly and L. R. Dodge at Musick, J. S. Carr, Herbert Cline, Tom Parker and Leston Durham at the Brice creek road camp, Harry and Donald Metcalf and Harold Bede at Gertrude lake and Harry Williams at Holland Meadows.

Trees Fight for Life.

Another thing I learned on this trip is that Nature provides some forms of plant life with almost human intelligence in their efforts to preserve life. The seeds from which trees grow are scattered by the winds. Frequently they find shelter in a rotting stump several feet from the ground. Often a dozen trees will start in the top of one old stump or snag. As the stump rots away no foothold is left for the roots that carry life-giving material to the trunk and branches. But that does not trouble or worry the hemlock. It sends its roots to solid earth down the outside of the stump, giving the stump the appearance of a huge devilfish. Near Champion camp on the Brice creek road there is a large hemlock that grew in this manner. The stump has nearly rotted, the trunk of the tree starts several feet from the ground, and to all appearances the seed must have started growing in the air.

The district ranger has charge of road construction in his district, as well as of trails and ways, therefore he has to be something of a surveyor and engineer; he has charge of construction of telephone lines; he has to be able to repair lines and telephones; he has to be foreman of the several crews he has at work in various parts of his district and does most of his directing by telephone; he has charge of construction of all buildings, shelters,
