JUNE AND JULY BIG MONTHS CITY LIBRARY

June and July circulations at the city library set a new record for these months, according to a report of Mrs. D. R. Hamant, librarian. The June circulation for 1931 was 1367, and the July circulation 1367. June circulations for past years follow: 1930, 1,069; 1929, 1,181; 1928, 1,142; 1927, 1,117. July circulation for 1930 totaled 923 and for 1929, 1023.

The June library report follows: Adult fiction, 1961; adult non fiction, 45; children's fiction, 301; children's non fiction, 155; grand total, 1562. Twenty-nine borrowers cards were issued and 49 canceled, leaving 1186 as the total number of borrowers. Two books were borrowed from the state library, giving a total of 161 for the year.

The July report follows: Adult fiction, 942; adult non fiction, 42; children's fiction, 277; children's non fiction, 106; grand total, 1367. The total number of borrowers was 1196 to 1196 with 17 cards issued and several canceled. The number of books from the state library for the month was two, bringing the total for the year to 163.
