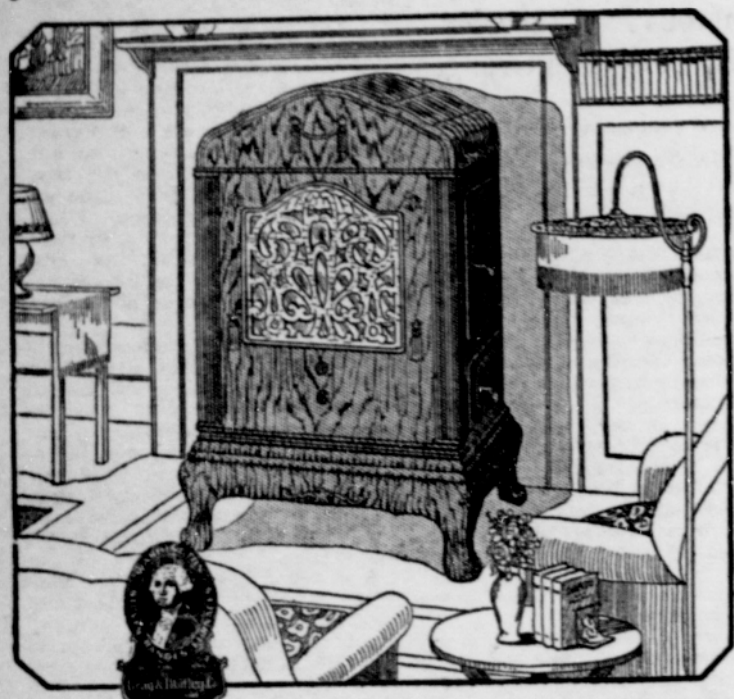

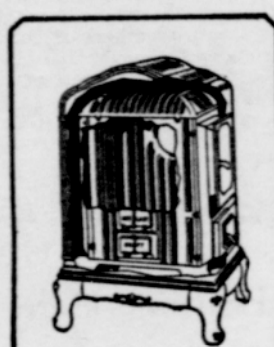

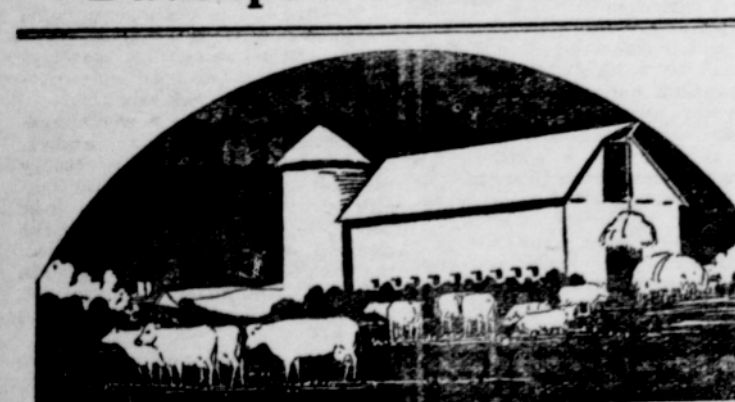

No Real Evidence That Reveals Origin of Golf

The only facts definitely established concerning the game of golf are that the game, in some primitive form, was played in Holland at an early date, and that it was developed in Scotland before the middle of the fifteenth century into a popular game. An act of the Scottish parliament in 1457 was directed against the playing of this sport, as interfering with the important practice of archery. Old Dutch paintings show that the Dutch used posts instead of holes in playing "kolf" or "kolfje." The name is derived from a word signifying "small club." James IV of Scotland played the game about the year 1500 and made it a royal as well as ancient game. There are other claims about the origin of golf that are not so well substantiated. One is that it was played by the Romans as early as 1200, and another is that it was played in Ireland in the time of St. Patrick. Another claims that the Roman game of "paganica," played with a crooked stick and a leather ball stuffed with feathers resembled golf. A game called bandy-ball or cambuca, played in England since Edward III's reign, has also been mentioned in this connection, though it appears to be more like hockey. Deadly Tarantula Easy Prey of "Killer" Wasp

Some insects are very ferocious. The tarantulas, as Rene Bach points out, spin no webs, but rely upon their strength and agility for the capture of their victims, the latter including an occasional mouse or ground-squirrel. And their homes are burrows, usually in the side of a clay bank, lined with silk. The door of the tarantula's house is set on a strong silken spring, and shuts with a snap when the owner has entered or comes out. At home the tarantula is perfectly safe; the entrance of the burrow being so camouflaged as to escape even scrutinizing observation, but on its walks abroad, the giant spider is always in danger of attack by the killer, which is a species of wasp. Against this wasp it has no adequate means of defense. Constantly turning this way and that, to face the enemy, it is inevitably taken, sooner or later, and stabbed with the killer's envenomed lance, and paralyzed. The duel invariably ends with the death or total disablement of the tarantula, in whose body the killer lays its eggs, in order that the baby wasps, when they are hatched, shall have food to eat.

Town of Ugly Duckling

Lovers of the tales of Hans Christian Andersen will probably agree that his story of the "Ugly Duckling" is one of the finest. What more natural, therefore, when in Denmark, after you have visited his home at Odense, to journey to Koge and when there seek out the old and interesting castle of Gisselved, where the story teller often stayed. Here the Ugly Duckling first saw the light and not far away is the castle of Borge, where the teller, when she was a child, lived. Although Koge is best known today for its bacon and sausage, the visitor will find it a splendid old town with a church of the thirteenth century named after Saint Claus, an evergreen old castle homesteads beside the sea which will make it a scenic memory for years.

Famous English Potter

Josiah Wedgwood was born on July 12, 1730. He was the youngest son of a potter and came of a family of which members had been notable potters in Staffordshire, England. Soon after the death of his father in 1755 he became skilled in the art of shaping pottery on the wheel. In 1755 he became manager of a small pottery. In 1759 he began work on his own account in the Ivy house pottery at Burslem. Salt glaze and green and yellow glaze seem to have been his first staples. However, the fine white English earthenware was just reaching perfection and Wedgwood became one of its best known makers. He presented a service of his ware to Queen Charlotte in 1762 and was appointed potter to the queen and later to the king. He next turned his attention to artistic pottery and reproduced designs based on the later phases of Greek art.

Coffee Production

The regions best adapted to the production of coffee are those between the parallels 15 degrees north and 15 degrees south latitude and from 1,000 to 4,000 feet above level. It is cultivated from latitude 25 degrees north to 30 degrees south in places where the temperature does not fall below 55 degrees Fahrenheit. Moist and somewhat shady slopes are found most desirable. Little streams of water are conducted to the roots of trees which are kept very wet until the fruit is nearly ripe, when the water is turned off to keep the fruit from becoming too succulent.
