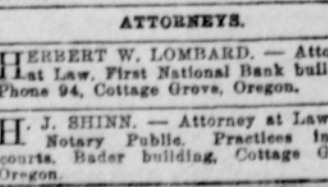

School Clinic Is Held.

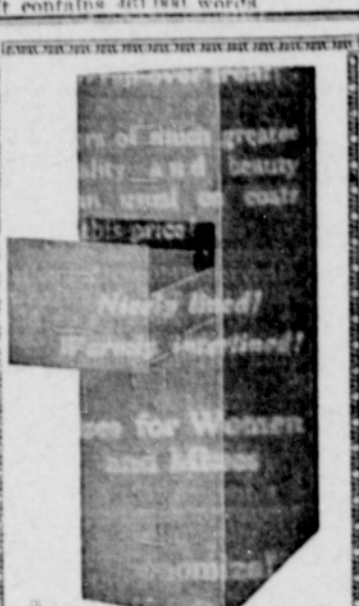
