

High School Notes

Amid the roars of laughter and flutter of green ribbons, the shining of grease paint, and the soft pattering of stockinged feet the high school students gathered Tuesday morning, October 27, in the gymnasium to witness the annual initiation of the incoming freshmen.

The most exciting moment of the morning occurred toward the end of the performance when a barrel of the boys' shoes, misnamed and tied together, was overturned and every boy scrambled wildly to find his shoes. "Little" Jack Kelly, president of the freshman class, gave a "long" and "learned" speech. The audience was entertained by a lullaby given by a group of freshman girls. Each made a comical appearance with her dress on backwards, her face smeared with grease paint and a doll in her arms. Led by Miss Ingalls, they were given a chance to show their skill by singing the old familiar song, "How Green I Am." Billie Lynn appeared, took his stand on an upturned barrel and filled the air with melody which held the audience spellbound as he yodelled for one minute.

Margaret Short gave a dissertation on how to study. Irene Shanda, "the most promising freshman," gave advice from a "perfect student." Lillian Young made a short speech. A recitation by Lorraine Coiner entitled "Little Orphan Annie" followed. Alice Allison, better known as "Billie," made a very successful (?) attempt at clogging. Jack Rau's proposal to Lucile Little was a touching affair as a large handkerchief was needed to absorb his gushing tears.

In fear and trembling the boys ran the gauntlet several times but the ordeal proved to be less severe than they expected as hands were used in paddling instead of belts. A balloon fight took place between Billie Lynn and Armand Wynne. Armand Wynne, who burst his balloons first, was the loser and was paddled. A military drill was led by Floyd McCullough. The girls were commanded to march around the room first very slowly then with increased speed. They ended by goose stepping. The boys formed sides for a tug of war. Losers of the peanut race had to paddle each other. Alice Allison led the freshman yell for each class and for the lettergirls and lettermen. Lawrence Weise, student body yell leader, led the students in a yell for the freshmen. Several students and faculty members expressed the opinion that this was the cleverest and best organized freshman initiation that had ever been given in this high school.
