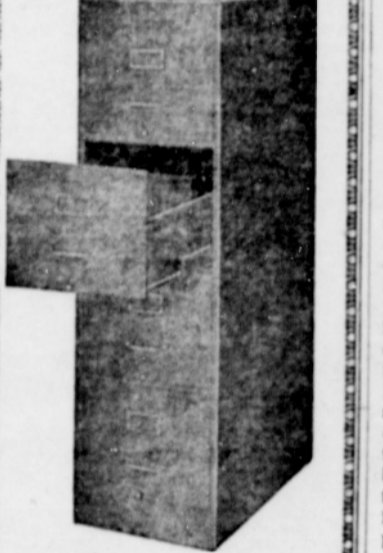
Miss Della Gallo left this week for Portland, where she will attend business college.
