WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

Following the close of the war General Pershing named to the national news bureau the ten outstanding heroes of the war.

That was 13 years ago.

As an Armistice day feature this year the same news bureau endeavored to locate the ten heroes and learn what they were doing.

These heroes were men who in the face of deadly fire performed heroic deeds and lived to tell the story. Several attacked machine gun nests singlehanded.

Several of them were found. One was a carpenter, one a plumber and all except one or two were employed in what would be generally spoken of as lowly positions. None

has become outstanding. Several could not be so much as located.

Our first thought is, "How quickly we forget our heroes!"

But how could it be otherwise? They were taken from the lowly positions in which they were again found. They were performing their duties as citizens. They went across the pond and performed their duties there. Those duties called them where they performed feats that were heroic, but it did not change them mentally or otherwise, unless

for the worse, for the war took a terrible toll in wrecked bodies and minds.

When they returned there was nothing for them to do except to return to the tasks from which they had been taken.

But there is another lesson to be learned. It is this: The average American rises to whatever position he is required to fill. Upon the spur of the moment he will perform heroic deeds if heroic deeds are called for. He meets the emergency as it presents itself.

We have peace-time heroes of which the world hears little. They perform deeds as heroic as any performed in war. The newspapers, or then the hero drops into oblivion unless another opportunity comes.

We Americans perform them when it is necessary to perform

them, and are content to remain the humble citizens that we were before.

It is this ability to meet the emergency when it arises and his willingness to immediately retire from the limelight that has helped to make America great.

STAY AT HOME.

From every important community comes the word, "Keep your kids at home. There's nothing for them here, and stay at home yourselves."

It's odd that so many who can't find jobs at home believe jobs are to be found elsewhere. Millions of dollars have been wasted during the depression by persons going from place to place to look for work and returning home again.

If you still have the nerve to pick up someone who has thumbed you on the highway, find out where he came from, where he is going, where he has been and 99 times out of a hundred you will find that he would have been better off if he had stayed where he started from, and that it has cost communities where he has been a considerable sum of money to keep him moving.

This writer has tried that several times, always with the same result, and those with whom they have come to start out, without money and without a job in sight and usually you'll get the answer, "We knew we'd be able to get there and back hitch hiking." The motorists who are willing to be imposed upon are responsible to a large degree for the fact that so many are squandering time and money on the highways when they would be better off if they had never started, and those with whom they have come in touch would be much better off.

Question those who stop at every town to solicit something to eat and a little gas, and a large part of the time it is the same story. They thought there were green fields elsewhere and now they are trying to get back to the place from which they started.

In these jobs are scarce in the old home town they are likely to be scarce elsewhere, and, in any event, putting onto others the expense of sending a person to look for a job and to get him back home when he doesn't find one is not the right attitude to be taken by one with good old red American blood in his veins.

WHISKY ADVERTISING. (?)

The Sentinel is not going to get into any wet and dry argument, but it can't help but take notice of ridiculous statements that are made on both sides of the question.

In a recent letter a proponent of prohibition said that papers talking in favor of repeal of prohibition are violating the law which prohibits liquor advertisements. There is no law to prohibit any newspaper from expressing its opinion on any subject, regardless of whether that opinion is sincere or not. The Sentinel has never published whisky advertising, of which there was plenty to get in days gone by, but it would not hesitate to let a wet express his opinions in its columns.

The ban on liquor advertising refers only to liquor offered for sale, and no stretch of the imagination can make it apply to expression of opinion on the wet and dry question, even though the paper might be paid for expressing such opinions.

In the case of the two papers referred to (Corvallis G-T and Salem C-J), while we seldom agree with the editorial opinions of either one, we'd bet our last nickel that money would not buy a line in the editorial columns of either one.
