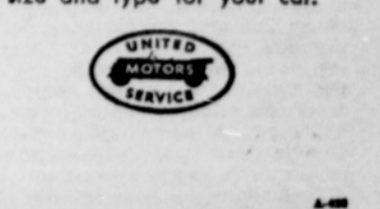
Mothers' Club in Need Of Clothing, Bedding
