Land Restored to Entry.

The United States land office at Roseburg has issued notice that NE 1/4 of section 21, Tp. 13 S., R. 7 W., W. M., in Lane county, containing 160 acres, has been restored to entry, subject to the preference rights of ex-service men. The land is open to entry by ex-service men on January 22, and to the general public on April 22, provided the land is still unentered.

Ex-service men must file with their applications for the land a soldier's affidavit and a certified copy of their discharge and all applicants must file a non-water reserve affidavit.

Only regular fees and commissions are required as this is cut-over land and reseeded railroad land.

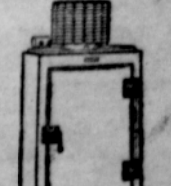
