Number High Pupils Passes 300 Mark

Total high school registration for the school year has set a new record for the Cottage Grove schools with 312, according to figures released Thursday by Superintendent D. A. Emerson. The registration is divided as follows: Freshmen, 98; sophomores, 69; juniors 56; seniors, 75, and unclassified, including post-graduate students, 12. This is the first time that total high school registration has gone over the 300 mark.

McArthur Court Bill Paid by Students

Eugene, Ore., Jan. 18.—Criticism of student activities in various universities and colleges of the nation was dealt a blow at the University of Oregon Saturday, when student and graduate officials burned in private ceremony bonds and interest coupons amounting to \$179,000, issued in 1929 for the construction of the McArthur court basketball pavilion on the campus.

Six officials of the Oregon student organization were present for Saturday's ceremony. They were: Eugene, Oregon, president of the organization, Ronald Robnett, assistant graduate manager; Paul Ager, comptroller of the university and treasurer of the associated students; Elmer Mims, president of the A. S. U. O.; Omar Palmer, chairman of the finance committee, and James Deendorf, former chairman of the finance committee.

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Garden Club to Assist Garden Growing Plans

A promise to assist in any way possible with the garden program being sponsored by the Cottage Grove Helief council was made by the Cottage Grove Garden club at its meeting last Friday.

O. V. Brees, chairman of the relief council, outlined the garden plan whereby it is hoped that unemployed can help themselves by raising vegetables the coming summer. The council proposes to obtain use of vacant lots and to turn these over for the use of unemployed persons not having garden ground. Meetings will be held from time to time to demonstrate methods of preparing soil, planting seed, cultivation and irrigation. If necessary the council will assist in procuring seed. Later in the season canning demonstrations will be given.

The club's January program consisted of the following: "Preparation of Soil for Planting Seeds and the Advantages of Using and the Construction of Hot Beds and Cold Frames," Mrs. R. H. Fields; "Arm-chair Gardening and Various Books on Cultivation and Raising of Flowers and Vegetables," Mrs. S. L. Godard; "Pruning of Shrubs and a Roses," Mrs. A. W. Shofstall. Mrs. Fields, chairman of the program committee, read the legend of the snowdrop, flower for January. Mrs. Godard and Mrs. N. E. Glass will be in charge of the next meeting, to be held February 19 in the city hall. Twenty members were present for Friday's meeting.

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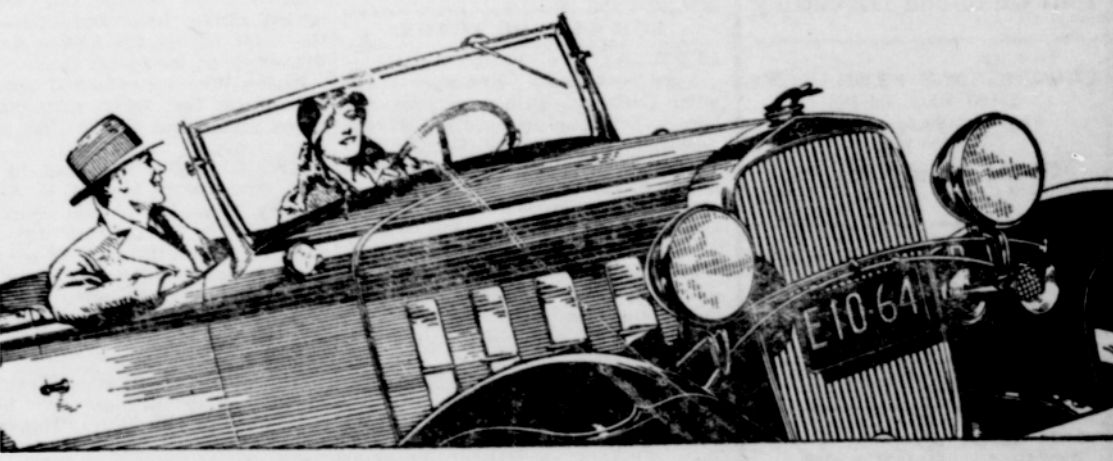
