The Sentinel staff's information on reptiles was not adequate for the job and the snakes were taken to Miss Elsie Lee, biology instructor in the high school, who made the classification. She believes the snakes are yearlings and were born last spring.
The snakes are each about a foot long and about as big around as an oat straw. They derive their name from a band of orange around their necks. They have black backs and orange bellies.
