PHILIPPINE QUESTION DISCUSSED BY PFAFF

Roger Alton Pfaff, good will ambassador as a member of the University of Oregon debate team which recently completed a good will tour of the Pacific basin, described phases of the present Pacific situation in a talk on "America in the Pacific" before the Lions club Thursday noon.

He dealt largely with the Philippine question, showing that these islands are the United States' only contact with the Orient. He declared himself irrevocably against immediate independence for the Philippines and pointed out that this would mean economic bankruptcy for the islands and would precipitate a crisis in the Far East that might result in a world conflagration.
