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\$96,698.27 Is Amount Of O. & C. Money 1932

Lane county should receive \$96,698.27 as its share of the O. & C. land grant fund money this year, figures released by C. A. Horton, auditor, indicated. Mr. Horton extended the fund for Lane county.

Provided congress makes no change in the present law, the county will receive this sum for distribution in the various divisions of the county for this year, County Judge C. P. Barnard said. There is the possibility that a bill said to have been introduced in congress may strike at this fund. Counties benefiting from it have organized to fight any attempt to eliminate the fund, and the most recent word from Washington indicated there probably is no great danger of losing it, Judge Barnard said.

The sum of \$96,698.27 for this year is less than the amount received last year, which was \$109,774.38. The sum is divided as follows: State and county, \$60,424.93; schools, \$15,701.59; union high schools, \$14,357.67; road districts, \$14,433.71; Port of Siuslaw, \$1,796.37.

Soliciting of Pupils Is Charge Against 'Big 4'

An answer charging that the "big four" schools of the county in Cottage Grove, Eugene, Springfield and Junction City, habitually solicit non-resident high school students under the law which these districts are attempting to avoid, has been filed by the county officials who are named as defendants in an action now in the circuit court.

One teacher from each of the school districts appears as a plaintiff and the purpose of the suit is to force the so-called Wheeler law unconstitutional and a substitute therefor the former tuition fund law. Each side has declared that it will appeal to the supreme court if defeated in the lower court.

County Is to Continue Clearing, Grubbing Road

Clearing and grubbing work on Lane county highways of the state secondary system will be continued, and the county will pay the state, expecting the state to repay Lane when funds are available from the state highway commission.

The county has been assured that funds will be advanced from the state secondary road funds in order to allow the county to keep men employed during the next three months. However, the state highway commission will be forced to issue bonds to raise the money necessary to meet these payrolls.

Meanwhile, Lane county will keep the men at work, doing as much as possible to relieve the unemployment situation in the county.

The highway commission is faced with a lack of funds just now, due to the fact that the automobile license fees, from which the secondary funds are derived, will not start coming in till next July.

A 10 per cent cut in salaries of Eugene school teachers is being considered.

Holderman Has Served With Distinction In Forests of Uncle Sam

Returns to Spend Remaining Years Quietly With Old-Time Friends.

E. S. Holderman, well known for his long service to the United States Forest Service, who has returned to Cottage Grove to spend his remaining years with his old-time friends, is the subject of the following biographical sketch in "Six-Twenty-Six," official mimeographed paper of the Umpqua forest.

An old timer has passed from the ranks of action to that of increasing number of "old faithfuls" who are now to receive their just reward in the form of an annual pension.

Yes, Ellsworth S. Holderman finished his official career with the forest service on the same forest he started with as a forest guard on July 2, 1909. He was appointed an assistant forest ranger on the Umpqua national forest effective May 1, 1910, and served as district ranger in the Bohemia district until April 1, 1925. On this latter date he was assigned to the Crater national forest as scaler on the Pelican Bay Lumber company sale.

Mr. Holderman later spent seven months on the Deschutes national forest as scaler on the Shovel-Hixon sale and then returned to the Umpqua, thus completing the circle and finishing his career.

While district ranger on the Umpqua, Holderman had charge of the big sale on Layne creek, embracing 162,890,000 B. F., which truly was a real sale in those days. His experiences thus gained admirably him for the extensive scaling work he did later.

"Elzy" Holderman, as he is affectionately known by his many friends, both in and out of the forest service, had the foresight to plan for retirement days. He bought a small home in his old home town of Cottage Grove many years ago, and now he has taken possession of that home to enjoy his retirement days with his good wife and old time friends. He says that he plans to get real enjoyment out of the days, months and years to come by jumping in his car and going to the coast for a clam digging expedition or for a jaunt up Layne creek (20 miles away) for a fishing trip where once he scaled logs, built roads, trails and telephone lines, wrestled with timber, and, etc., so continuously that fishing had an extremely low priority on his work plan.

"Elzy" admits that he will help the good old Umpqua in case of a fire jam or the like, but that right now he is in such a state of mind about enjoying life that he mustn't expect too much.

And this ends an episode covering a period of approximately 22 years in the life of one who gave the best in him for the advancement of the profession he loved and enjoyed.

"Yankee" Mommie Cakes. Make into balls, the same as hamburger or bulk pork sausage, and fry in deep fat. May be served either hot or cold.

"Yankee" Mommies (in Ramekins). (Ramekins are small pots or molds of porcelain, earthenware or metal.)

Fill small ramekins and bake at a slow heat until sufficiently baked through. They may be made well done or rare according to the likes of the consumer, but baked at a slow heat therefore that the oven is not too hot. Those baked in a very hot oven are not nearly
