4-H CLUBBERS MAKE PROFIT IN DEPRESSION

Lane County Leads in Number of New Clubs Organized During Year 1931.

Despite the difficulties adult farmers are experiencing in "making ends meet," some 19,119 4-H club members of Oregon during the past year carried on work with a gross value of \$27,903.20, which, after deducting operating expenses, left them with a profit of \$91,543.85, according to the annual report just filed by H. C. Seymour, state club leader.

The club boys and girls of the state have evidently already absorbed a truth which many adults are just beginning to recognize—that the only way to make money during low price periods is to low production costs. While the gross value of the club work done last year was \$11,393.55 less than the previous year, the net profit was increased in the year 1931.

Club enrollment, too, picked up nearly 25 per cent last year, increasing from 1711 clubs with 15,660 members in 1930 to 2109 clubs including 19,119 members in 1931.

Lane county again led the state in number of clubs organized with 125, followed by Marion with 182, Douglas with 176, and City of Portland with 174. Clackamas, Washington and Multnomah were other leading counties, while Wheeler was the only county with no organized clubs.

Spring clubs appeared to be the most popular of the 33 different kinds of projects carried, followed by poultry, health-growing and dairy clubs. Other projects included sheep, sheep, beef calf, dairy record, goat, poultry, corn, potatoes, garden, wheat, canning, homemaking, improving home beauty, beekeeping, rabbit, bee, farm accounting, farm mechanics, rose and flower, forage, marketing, pigeon, salt, dairy, all of Woodard's, cucumber, orchard care, and the newly standardized forestry project.

The greatest total value above cost was realized by the dairy calf clubs, followed by poultry and poultry clubs.
