remove your doubt as to whether the committee made a report, will call your attention to the first sentence of the first paragraph of the report which certainly confirms my position and ought to convince you that the committee did make a report. However, if you are still in doubt, the fact that 14 members of the committee, including your- self, signed the report and the recorder certified to its correctness, should remove that doubt.

(The Sentinel doesn't see that it is of any importance whether the recorder or the budget committee made the report to which Mr. Kem refers. However, as a matter of fact, the budget committee, in all the years the city has had such a committee, has made the report.)

Mr. Kem is, however, at least partly excusable for his error. The names of members of the budget committee have never appeared in the correct position in the published report and summary of indebtedness. They were printed at the conclusion of the tentative budget which they prepare, instead of at the conclusion of the summary of indebtedness, which the recorder prepares.

You say, "No portion of the \$100,000 issue for the main line into the mountains has ever been refunded. If you know this, Mr. Editor, you know it because you have inside information which the budget does not disclose and as to what bonds were refunded, I naturally supposed they were a part of the \$100,000 issue and to show that this mistake is a plausible one, will add, there are others who made the same mistake, which demerit, I feel, Jefferson E.
