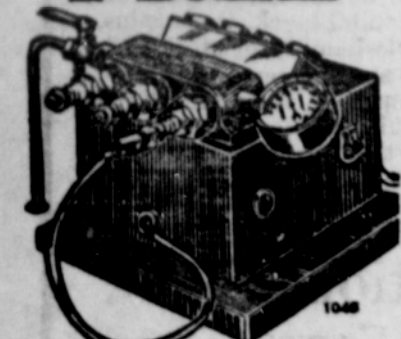


SILK CREEK.
