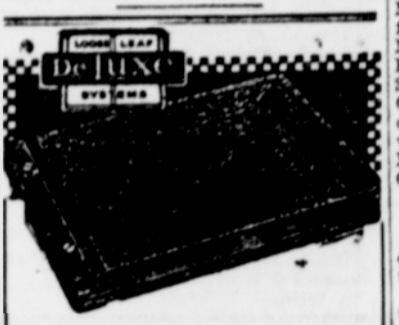

A severe fall suffered in October brought on a condition on a rundown condition and a weakened heart for Mr. Umphrey that caused them to remain here. Umphrey was a member of the Methodist church. Besides the widow, Miss Umphrey, and two sons, C. E. Umphrey, and C. H. Umphrey, a daughter, Lenore Umphrey of Lincoln, Neb., survives. The last named was a visit here before her father's death and will continue her journey to reach here in time for the funeral.
