

LANE AGREEMENT WITH COMMISSION IS TOLD

County Judge Claims County Has Saved Money Through Advance of Funds

The much-discussed issue of an agreement between Lane county and the state highway commission, whereby funds were advanced Lane county, is explained in the following communication from County Judge Barnard:

"When Lane county road bonds were voted in 1929, the pamphlet issued by the Lane County Good Roads association called attention to the fact that these bonds would not complete bond number 2, the low pass road from Pacific highway to Blachly by Cheahsie and Bear Creek, 37 miles, for which only \$347,000 was provided.

Wildcat to Cushman, 36 miles, for \$23,000; and from Florence to North County line, 20 miles, for \$38,500. The state highway commission has advanced the money for these roads so far in the future that their construction would be a matter for future consideration. However, because of the unemployment situation, appropriated large sums of money for certain types of road work.

"To go before the people and ask for another bond issue of \$1,000,000 to complete these highways, which included the completion of Willamette highway to Oakridge and the McKenzie highway, would have taken time, and would have cost a large amount of interest. Due to the fact that the state highway commission has advanced a quarter of a million dollars without interest, to get the work started on Willamette highway, we felt it was only fair to ask the State Highway Commission to advance this money (without interest) as demanded by the federal government on these different roads which would not be repaid what amount might be needed each year, reimbursing themselves from the automobile license fees the county each year, until fully repaid.

"This was called to the attention of the people in September, 1930, at a mass meeting for the purpose in the chamber of commerce, Eugene, and was again called to their attention at a large mass meeting in Eugene, Oregon, on October 12, 1930, and was endorsed at both meetings.

"The petition for this agreement was presented to the state highway commission in September, 1930, and was turned over to their attorney, J. M. Devers, to prepare an agreement if he found that this could be legally done. This he did, and the final agreement was signed October 24, 1930, to take effect January 1, 1931.

"There was expended in Lane county in 1931 upon this agreement on Oregon Coast highway, McKenzie highway, Willamette highway and Siuslaw highway, \$1,903,850. Lane county has received \$560,522.43. We were credited on this account, on account of the income from automobile license fees, with \$105,207.12. The net amount over a bond issue, as we would have needed at least \$1,000,000 to cover our share of the cost of construction of the state highways, and I do not think any organization would have approved not completing these highways and turning them over to the state as rapidly as possible, when we had such a heavy investment, and the unemployment situation was so serious.

"We have expended on state highways from the bond issue only \$560,000, \$1,235,500 having been expended on county and market roads. Outstanding bonds at present amount to \$1,135,600. We have had interest to the amount of \$720,957.73 on these bonds to May 1, 1932.

"This agreement with the state highway commission was wholly in the interest of Lane county, and will probably save \$125,000 to the taxpayers over what a bond issue would have cost."

Hens and Chicks Are Under 1931 Production

Fewer hens and chicks than usual on farms in the United States is indicated by a report on the agricultural situation just released by the Oregon agricultural extension service. The number of hens on farms in May was estimated at 2 percent less than a year previous, the smallest number in eight years.

About the same number of chicks of this year's hatching were reported in farm flocks on May 1 as a year before, but 10 percent fewer than the 5-year average on that date. The report said that 7.6 percent fewer chicks were hatched in commercial hatcheries during April this year than in 1931 in the whole country and that orders booked for May delivery and later were 8.2 percent less than a year ago.

On the Pacific coast, April hatchings by commercial hatcheries ran 24.6 percent behind last year and booked orders for May and later were short 29.4 percent.

The commercial hatchery chick output has fallen behind 1931 in the season in the west by 10 percent, and is also somewhat short in the eastern part of the country. Information on the volume of farm hatchings is incomplete but some observers think that enough chicks have been produced from this source to offset in part the reduction in commercial chicks.
