Ancient Bushmen

Deep in the wooded foothills of the Drakensberg may yet be found the secret of South Africa's first inhabitants. Scientists are busy probing the secrets of Berg Bushmen in hilly valleys where grow luxuriant palms and gigantic yellowwood trees that date back for 2,000 years. A skull, a number of clay pots and other relics have also been found in caves which abound in the area. Feeding School Children
