## Indian Relics Gathered

## From New Jersey Caves

Scientists carefully going over the ground at Moody's Rock and Bevans have recovered some very interesting relics of the Indian occupancy of that part of the state of New Jersey. These articles are on exhibition at the state capital and they include celts (blade-like instruments), arrowheads of Jasper and chaledony (a whitish quartz of waxy luster), bone awls and stone drills. An unidentified piece, possibly a ceremonial stone, is one of the most interesting relics uncovered at Bevans. The slate ornament is grooved in the middle, the reverse side showing a round indentation.

At Bevans there are two caves, opening to the left and right of the rock roof projection, which is about 60 feet long. The cave to the right is low and damp, the one to the left is dry, habitable and 7 feet high. While material had been taken from this shelter during a previous excavation many years ago, further diggings unearthed 24 arrowheads of fine flint, Jasper, chaledony and rhyolite, together with a 4-inch spearhead, several knife blades, hammerstones, Unio shells (a species of mussel), potsherds and a thumb scraper of red Jasper (used by Indians to smooth bone and soft stone implements).

## Fabulous Birds Feature

## of Old Songs and Story

Crane, dove, heron and duck are among birds of historic times which resemble the fabulous birds of ancient days. Scratched on stone, the Chaldeans left behind them a bird with sharply curved beak. Its long wings, outspread, look like two fine-toothed combs. There is the fantasy bird of the Hopi Indian artist. Round and fat, with a small head, the fantasy bird is reflected in the art of the Chinese, Peru and Japan. Egypt's chequered heron and Persia's duck in conventionalized forms reflect the imagination of ancient story tellers who put the birds into song and story.

The albatross is in the procession of feathered spirits, with its long pocket-tipped beak and bright eyes. So is the Ancient Mariner, with the shadowy albatross tied round his neck, on the deck of a ship that drifts becalmed upon "a painted ocean."—New York Times Magazine.

## New York Cold Spot

The coldest spot in the eastern part of this country is thought to be Owl's Head, in Franklin county, New York. Temperatures of 30 to 40 degrees below zero are not unusual there. A few winters ago the hardy souls who inhabit the hamlet claimed 90 below. Verification was impossible, for the mercury in all local thermometers went down and out at about 50 below. Owl's Head lies 1,530 feet above sea level on the northern tip of the Adirondack plateau. From this point to Malone the railroad drops 900 feet in less than ten miles. Winds coming direct from the North pole first strike land at Owl's Head. Franklin county was once described in a speech in the legislature as "the Siberia of New York," and Owl's Head is its chilliest spot. A native, questioned about the climate, once said: "We have two seasons here, July and winter."—Washington Star.

## Paradise for Shoppers

For centuries the center of Japan's arts and crafts, Kyoto, the ancient capital, has never relinquished its leadership in the creation of things beautiful. Here, in tiny shops handed down from father to son, the secrets of the craft are jealously guarded as nimble fingers turn out the beautiful cloisonnes, the boxes and trays and cases of damascene and lacquer, the inimitable swords, whose blades surpass those of Damascus, the bronzes in various sizes and shapes—from the huge more-than-man-high lantern to the delicate silver bronze match box, the dainty Satsuma and Awata ware—Kyoto is the shopper's Paradise.

## Don't Overfeed Goldfish

Overfeeding is the commonest cause of death among goldfish. Feed them only every other day, and just what they will eat. At the start you will not know just how much to feed them for a meal. Therefore, remove the leftover food and feed less next time. You will soon learn by experience how much they should have each time. Too much feeding can be detected by the sluggish movements of the fish and a tendency for them to stay continually at the bottom of the aquarium.

## Bears' Complete Stupor

When a bear retires for the winter, his sleep is very little like ordinary sleep. The state of unconsciousness is much deeper and far more difficult to break. Only one thing can break this death-like sleep, and that is temperature. A rise in temperature quickly will thaw out frogs, toads and snakes, which, while not listed among the "seven sleepers," spend the winter in complete torpor, at about the temperature of the earth around them.

## Ideal of Truth-Telling

## "Hardest Thing in Life"

On the moral side an inflexible habit of truth implies most of the virtues. Courage, for example, "Without courage, for example, truth, and without truth there can be no other virtue," was one of Sir Walter Scott's infrequent ethical judgments.

It is also a social grace. There is no greater bore than the man who, from some mental twist or defect, is habitually slipshod in his statements of fact. John Buchan, writing in the London Graphic, asserts. I do not refer to the pleasant habit of making things a little more dramatic and amusing than they actually are, of giving a story "a cocked hat and a horse"; or the exaggerations and understatements which have a humorous purpose. I mean the incurable, half-unconscious inexactness which afflicts some people who have no intent to deceive.

But when we pass from the obvious duties of not telling cowardly or cruel lies and of aiming at the rough-and-ready fidelity to fact which ordinary life demands, we find the ideal of truth-telling a difficult one—the most difficult thing in life. A right conception of what truth means does not come early in education; it is its ultimate goal, and a goal not often reached.

## Discovers Evidence of

## Old Hawaiian Culture

Paved stone foot trails extending over the widest and rockiest stretches of lava, artificial fish ponds, which are formed by building a barrier of rock across a narrow bay or cove, and playgrounds represented by prepared tracks down grassy slopes for sled coasting are among the accomplishments of a forgotten culture found by W. M. Walker of the bureau of American ethnology on the almost deserted island of Maui in the Hawaiian group.

He also found sites of 230 altar places, usually on headlands overlooking the sea and oriented towards the ocean, which evidently had a prominent place in the old religion. The largest of these was more than 400 feet long and had a terraced slope 500 feet high extending over the edge of the hill. Much of this culture, especially the paved trails, is attributed by the natives to the genius of a legendary hero.

The old chiefs, Mr. Walker found in his research, carried on under the auspices of the Bishop museum of Honolulu, were buried in almost inaccessible cliffs where it is practically impossible to find their graves.

## Crafts of England

Of all the souvenirs which tourists love to bring back with them objects of national or local craftsmanship hold a first place. In England many old crafts still survive in the country places, but they must be searched out. Famous old Buckingham lace can be yet obtained near Beaconsfield from bobbins ages old, real old turned wooden bowls in cherry, yew or elm from Chesham, pottery and beautiful pewter, copper and brass ware at Saffron Walden in Essex and at Newport in the same county, the Saffron Cottage industry, old furniture and at Widdington, rush matting, the earliest form of carpet, made from the sweet-scented rushes of that green and beautiful land.

## Meteors Move Fast

Meteors travel at the tremendous speed of 26 miles per second. This will explain why some meteorites are not when picked up immediately after they fall and why other meteorites, excavated some hours after they fall, are at that time so cold that frost forms on them as soon as they are exposed to the air. Meteors as they fly about in outer space are dark and extremely cold bodies. When they approach the earth, the friction with the earth's atmosphere causes their outer surface to become white hot and molten.

## Mysterious Magnetic Rocks

Magnetic boulders may have played a part in a shipwreck when the American liner Western World went aground off Ponta do Bol, on the Brazilian coast. According to shipping men the rocks exert a powerful magnetic attraction similar to that of the loadstone. Although the force of attraction is not nearly enough to draw a ship upon the dangerous shoal, it is known sometimes to throw compasses of passing ships as much as ten points out of true. Thus a liner may lose its bearings and be swept on the rocks by an inshore current.

## Changed Meaning of Names

The meaning of words is always changing and one reason for this is because we adopt a word from another language and incorporate it in our own, giving a different interpretation to its meaning. This word "tempo" used so universally in music is an example of this. The French word temps, means time, that is, the parts or divisions of musical notes, but we do not use "temps," or "tempo" in that sense. Neither do the Germans. Their "Tempo wie vorker" means, the tempo primo, the former speed of the piece, not the division of notes.
