

**SCHOOLS OPERATED AT
\$2,457 UNDER BUDGET**

**Delinquency in Taxes Increases
Warrants, Bonded Indebtedness Reduced.**

Schools of the city for fiscal year which ended June 30 were operated for \$2,457.54 less than provided in the budget for the year. Despite this reduction in expenses the tax delinquency was such that the warrant indebtedness increased from \$5,113.97 to \$9,665.33. The increase is more than offset by delinquent taxes, the larger part of which the school board expects to be paid during the coming year. There was also a decrease in receipts because of the smaller number of children of school age in the district. The number was 851, which was 83 less than the year before.

The financial report of School District No. 1, Harvey, for the year ending June 30, 1934, shows that special taxes were \$12,259.24 less than anticipated, that receipts from the county high school were \$1,469.75 less than anticipated, that receipts from the county elementary fund were \$192.91 less than anticipated, that receipts from the state fund were \$19.16 less than anticipated, that receipts from the Douglas county high school were \$29.41 less than anticipated, that receipts from the county high school were \$1,343.90 less than anticipated, that receipts from national subsidies for 1930-1931 were \$937.50 greater than anticipated, that receipts from tuition in the grades were \$51 greater than anticipated and sundry refunds and rentals were \$139 greater than anticipated. Considering the huge decrease of about 20 per cent in anticipated receipts the showing of an increase in warrant indebtedness was not large.

Property of district, buildings, equipment and grounds is inventoried at \$143,775. The manner in which the fund is insured makes it certain that 90 per cent on any loss and recovery 100 per cent on any loss. The probability was less than 90 per cent of total property owned.

Bonded indebtedness was reduced to \$100,000, leaving a balance of \$39,500 at the same rate of payment the present indebtedness will be cleared.

No children blind, deaf, dumb, feeble minded or physically handicapped were reported during the year.

The average cost of pupils in the district school for the year was \$73. The average cost of the grades the cost was \$70 and the average cost of the high school was \$103. These costs are well below the average for the state.

The financial report of School District No. 1, Harvey has been certified as correct by the district auditor, J. W. V. Copies of the clerk's report are in the hands of all school officials, and will welcome examination by anyone interested. In account of publicity this is the only report of the kind that will be given the re-

ral money made available by recent congress for construction of municipalities. The money could be used for reconstruction of the city's water system. Application for the money made by Mayor N. E.
