\$75,000 FOR ROADS TO BOHEMIA ASKED

To get the money necessary to show that there is an urgent need of the work, it is believed by miners that a good motor truck road would result in unusual activity, as owners of several properties are planning activities even with present roads.

County Fruit Inspector Stewart recommends one pound of lead arsenate to each 50 square feet of orchard. A mixture of 4-4-50 Bordeaux mixture should be used in combination with the lead arsenate.
