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Red Cross Swimming Classes Start Aug. 15

The learn-to-swim and life saving program of the Cottage Grove Red Cross will start Monday, August 15. Either the mill race dam or the steel bridge swimming hole will be used. Lessons are to be free and a competent instructor will be in charge. There will be four classes: 1-Non-swimmers, those unable to swim a stroke; 2-Beginners, those able to swim a short way; 3-Junior life saving, expert swimmers from 12 years of age up; 4-Senior life saving, expert swimmers from 17 years of age up. The schedule of classes for the first day is as follows: 10-Adult non-swimmers, 10:30-Adult beginners, 11-Girl non-swimmers, ages 7 to 15, 1:30-Boy non-swimmers, ages 7 to 15, 2-Boy beginners, ages 7 to 15, 2:30-Junior life saving, ages 12 and over, 3:30-Senior life saving, ages 17 and over. It will be necessary for those wishing to join one of these classes to use the following application blank, which should be placed on file with City Recorder Brees:

Taxpayers League Has Half Voters as Members

The South Lane County Taxpayers league now has a membership equal to almost half the voting strength of this end of the county. Fifteen new members were signed at the monthly meeting of the organization Tuesday night. The larger part of the time of the meeting was devoted to a discussion of replies received from candidates for office in response to a query of the league asking whether such candidates, if elected, would voluntarily take a cut in salaries. No candidate gave a direct reply to the question, referring to the corrupt practices act as making it impossible to give such an answer, but the larger number of the letters were considered satisfactory. An abundance of material dealing with the county organization of school directors and other subjects has been received for use of the committee on educational economy.
