Thief Delivered Into Hands of His Enemies. Ancient Greeks Knew Coal. Some 300 years B. C. Theophrastus, famed Greek orator and philosopher, wrote about coal in the following language: "Those substances that are called coals and are broken for use as earth, but they kindle and burn like wooden coals." The coal he refers to was found in certain localities in Greece. The first written receipt for coal in England was given by the Abbey of Peterborough in 852. A. D. and was for 12 cartloads of coal. Among the other "firsts" was an account of the mining of coal in 1180, recorded in the book of the bishop of Durham.

Land Once Connecticut's. The Western Reserve, or Connecticut Reserve, was that portion of the Northwest territory reserved by Connecticut, when in 1786 that state ceded to the United States other parts of the territory claimed under the charter of 1662, which granted to Connecticut land limited east and west by the sea. This section of land is what is now included in the northeastern part of Ohio. It was all the territory between latitude 41 and 43 degrees 2 minutes north and extending 120 miles from the western boundary of Pennsylvania.
