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THE BONUS ARMY.

One thing that happened at the recent national convention of the American Legion, the significance of which may have been lost in many, was the failure of all efforts to pass any resolution referring to the eviction of the bonus army.

By refusing to say anything the Legion said more forcefully than words could have said it that the bonus army was not an American Legion body.

Possibly nothing has been more misunderstood than the march on Washington and its treatment at Washington. The Legion probably got more undeserved criticism than did the government.

At the time of the march upon Washington one was authorized to express the opinion of the Legion and it was a situation that was sure to bring criticism to the government regardless of how kindly its acts may have been.

The Legion demonstrated its patriotism by refusing to consider any resolution that might be wrongfully construed.

Inasmuch as the Legion was injured by having the march on Washington wrongly dubbed a Legion movement, readers will be interested in a statement in the October issue of The Oregon Legionnaire, official state Legion publication, repudiating Commander Waters of Portland and the men he took with him to the national capital. The Legionnaire says that Waters was not a member of the Legion when he left for Washington at the head of some 200 foot soldiers and that not a single one of the 200 had paid dues to the Legion for the year 1932. Most of them never had been members at any time.

This statement is highly pleasing to the hosts of friends of the Legion who did not thoroughly understand the situation and who did not wish to waver in their high regard for this great patriotic organization.

AS USUAL THE TAXPAYER PAYS THE BILL

County roads are built by the residents thereof with funds contributed through a general property road tax. State roads are built with funds that such taxpayers and others provide through the payment of license and mileage fees and gas taxes. The state will not permit these county taxpayers to operate their private autos or trucks over their own county roads without first securing a state license, but anyone holding such a license may, without further charge, operate over county roads although built with taxpayers' money.

There are over 23,000 privately owned and operated trucks in this state. Most of these are light trucks and owned by taxpayers. They are subject to an average annual license fee of \$37.50. Add to this the annual road tax paid by their owners and compare the total with the average annual license fee (\$59.00) paid by the 2444 "Contract Hauler" freighters that operated, day and night, over our public highways through the last fiscal year.

Farm trucks should pay but a nominal license fee. Why? Because the owners of these trucks have already contributed, through road taxes, the funds necessary for the construction and maintenance of their county's roads and it is to such roads that their trucking operations are largely confined; and, further, because they permit thousands of non-tax paying automobiles and for-hire owners to operate over county roads and without charge.

It will be said that the counties share in the license money collected by the state. Such moneys when received by counties, if not needed to redeem road bonds, must be used to provide right-of-ways, prepare road beds and construct bridges for state roads.

The time has come when owners of automobiles and private trucks should demand relief. They may secure lower license fees if the operators of the huge for-hire freight trucks and trailers are more to contribute a fair share of the cost of constructing and maintaining our public highways.

The proposed Highway Protection Law (Freight Truck and Bus Bill) opens the door to relief.

IS OREGON WET OR DRY?

Oregon has been considered a leader among the dry states. It was one of the first to vote dry preceding enactment of the national amendment. It has one of the driest of dry laws, and in prohibition it has been one of those showing strong prohibitionist tendencies.

On the ballot in November will be an amendment to the constitution which would tell exactly how the state stands, provided voters know exactly what they are voting for, and there is no reason why they shouldn't. The amendment provides for straight repeal of the state prohibition amendment, lock, stock and barrel.

In such a vote prohibitionists will have a slight advantage, for the reason that no substitute for the present prohibition law is suggested and many will fear that, if the national prohibition laws should be repealed, we should have a return to the saloon. Many favoring modification will vote against complete repeal until a satisfactory substitute is included. Others would vote for modification that provided for light wines and beers. Many of these will vote dry rather than take a chance on having whisky come back.

Voters have their minds pretty well made up to how they stand on the wet and dry issue, but they should fully understand what they are to vote upon. It is straight repeal and that would leave liquor regulation entirely to the federal government, with the addition of whatever regulatory laws remain on the state's law books, such as local option.

It should also be fully understood by the voters that whatever action Oregon takes will be made the most of in national campaigns for and against repeal of the eighteenth amendment. Repeal of the state bone dry law would be a great aid to the national forces for repeal of the federal amendment. Likewise a vote for retention of the state's dry law would be of great encouragement and aid to the national dry forces.

Oregon congressmen, in voting upon reestablishment of the eighteenth amendment, will be guided by the vote upon repeal, which also adds importance to the issue. It will take many years to get the national amendment repealed, if it ever is repealed, but the issue in Oregon is the beginning of the attack upon prohibition and every voter should express his opinion as to what he believes is best for his family, his state and his nation.

CHANGING HORSES.

He gets up in the morning and drinks coffee, and goes out for a walk or a bath without having seen anybody, then he settles down to work, or for another bath; then he has his dinner or plays tennis or goes down stairs to read.

He spends the evening in his own room, and only after supper does he spend a little time with us, reading newspapers or illustrated magazines. And this regular and egotistical life goes on day after day, without love for anyone, and without any interest in all the joys and sorrows of his near ones.—From the Diary of Sophie Andreyevna Tolstoy.

But she lives in the light now, for her sight has been restored. A surgical operation, performed in Portland, removed the cataracts that have kept her in the shadows since birth.

Happy? She is so overwhelmed with gladness that her very sentence almost ripples with laughter and every expression on her young face is a smile.

And it's a bewildering world that she is in. "What's that?" she queried as, passing along the street, her new eyes sighted an elevator lifting new bundles of Journals from the basement to the sidewalk at "The Journal building." And "What's that?" in her joyous voice is her frequent query as, here and there, objects that are strange to her young life come under her new and precious vision.

She will be able to read when she learns how. In her new and wonderful adventures more of the ways and works of life have to be learned all over again. To be sure, it's a late beginning, but what's the postponed start in La Vetta Smith's changed and beautiful life?

La Vetta was an inmate of the Salem school for the blind. Soon after Professor Walter Dry went there he had Portland oculists make an examination of all the inmates. La Vetta was selected as one whose eyes might be helped by surgery. A preliminary operation was performed June 14 and a final operation a few days ago.

And the result of the surgical service, gratuitously given, is another and gorgeous world for La Vetta Smith, the happiest of all the girls in it.
