

SCHOOL GRABBING BILL IS SCORED BY L. T. HARRIS

Claims of Great Savings Are Torn to Shreds by Eugene Man. Speaker Shows That Increase in Appropriations Would Be Immediate.

Claims that the school removal or wrecking bill could make any savings in the cost of education in Oregon were shattered by Judge Lawrence T. Harris of Eugene in a talk made before a dinner meeting of the chamber of commerce Tuesday night, and facts were presented to indicate that there would more likely be immediate need of added millions in state money for new buildings at Corvallis, while those at Eugene, Monmouth, Ashland and LaGrande, particularly those at Eugene, would be largely unused. Tax rates over Lane county would be increased, Judge Harris said, because of depreciated valuations in Eugene which would result in 3,000 students who would spend a million or two a year, as well as members of the faculty, would be moved to Corvallis and a large proportion of business property would remain idle for years while the city was taking up the slack.

Judge Harris pointed out that, although the present millage tax of 2.04 is not disturbed by the school removal bill, the proponents claim that a saving of a million dollars a year could be saved, that the deduction of a million dollars from the slightly more than two millions raised by the millage levy would leave less than is now required by the agricultural college with an enrollment of 1,000 students. If the university were removed to Corvallis, which would leave nothing for the medical college in Portland, nothing for the school of teachers' college at Eugene, nothing for the normal schools that would become junior colleges at Eugene when the pioneers of Lane county, during the years of one of the worst depletions of the country has ever known, gave the state a tract of land and the money with which to erect Deady hall thereon.

He told how contributions were made in cows, horses, pigs and other livestock and these contributions turned into cash by the university committee. Judge Harris referred to the estimate of Assessor Keeney that would be reduced a third in Eugene, that \$20 would be added to every \$100 of assessed valuation in that city and \$4.50 to every \$100 of valuation over the county. He also said that bonds issued by the university in Eugene would be worth nothing, while bonds issued by Eugene, Monmouth, Ashland and LaGrande would be greatly depreciated. He gave cogent reasons why no resident of Eugene, why no friend of the university, why no friend of the college, why no friend of the normals, why no one interested in any of the schools of the state, why no taxpayer, why no one not even interested as a taxpayer could consistently vote for the school moving or wrecking bill.

In reply to a question, the speaker explained that residents of Corvallis were at first so certain that the removal bill would become law that their plans had been so shrewdly made, that all property that would be benefited by the removal of the university to Corvallis had been placed under option by those who knew of the proposed plans.

Wm. Thum Independent Candidate for Council

The city election continues to stir, especially in the first ward, where William Thum is running out as an independent candidate against Andrew Brund and Harry Neet, whose names will appear on the ballot for the four-year term of alderman. Mr. Thum's name will have to be written in. For the first time J. E. Young will have opposition to certain peace of this district. E. E. McLeod's name will appear on the ballot as a candidate for that office.

DAY RETURNS TO MINE WHERE HE PROSPECTED

Chunk of Bohemia Ore, Carried in Pocket, Keeps His Dream Alive.

For 30 years L. S. Day carried a piece of Bohemia ore in his pocket as a reminder of his determination to some time return to the district and start a mining property.

Mr. Day was a prospector in the district 40 years ago, leaving here about 30 years ago and following the dream of a fortune in the district while dreaming of the days he would return to the old hills. A few weeks ago he arrived here backed by Hollywood capital, bought the James Sears group of claims on the east slope of Fairview and prepared for operations.

There are 32 claims in the group, ten of them heavy with base ore. They join, or nearly join, both the Fairview and the Champion groups, which have been heavy producers, and Mr. Day looks for big things on his properties as well as on numerous other properties of the district.

The budget which has been furnished by Mr. Day's backers provides for the installation of a 10-stamp mill in the spring to be used in experiments with methods for treating the ores, to be followed during the following summer with additional units until there is sufficient equipment for handling 100 tons of ore.

The company which Mr. Day represents is a closed corporation with no stock for sale and is said to be already adequately financed to complete the plan it has made.

The Sears claims, believed to be splendid properties, are among the best developed in the district and a considerable crew will be recruited in driving tunnels and otherwise opening ore bodies.

Work is well under way at the Lead Crystal group with buildings that will house a 100-stamp mill of the ball type.

REPORT WORK FOR PAST YEAR IS MADE BY RELIEF COUNCIL

Complete Card Index Is Made of Unemployed to Aid in Giving Work.

Garden Plan Originated Here Is Adopted Over Entire County.

That the Cottage Grove relief council has the relief problem well in hand and has been operating effectively during the past year was shown by reports made at the annual meeting of the council held recently.

The report of Chairman Brees showed that there is a complete card index of the unemployed of the city and community, the file containing all information necessary for determining those eligible for relief jobs, that approximately 800 families were indexed this year and that no work is given except after a thorough investigation by a relief committee, that advice was the larger part of relief given by the council, that 180 boxes of seed valued at \$2 a box were distributed to those unable to buy their own seed, that the relief garden plan has been adopted over the county and in other counties, that the need for clothing and shoes was emphasized by C. A. Beldier and Miss Robertello, Red Cross operative.

All officers of the past year were re-elected.

The secretary was authorized to pay the Lane County Red Cross \$150 for the annual roll call.

The report of Robert Fromm, secretary, was as follows:

In addition to the amount shown in the secretary-treasurer's report, the school teachers contributed \$100 directly for dental work for the needy. The two dentists of the city contributed their labor, charge for material at cost only being made.

Branded Potato Sacks Are to Be Discussed

Potato growers of Lane county who are interested in using uniform, branded potato sacks this year will hold a meeting in the chamber of commerce rooms in Eugene at 1:30 Saturday, October 8, according to County Agent O. S. Fitcher who has called the meeting.

The object is to consider benefits to be derived from marketing potatoes in uniform, branded bags and to make arrangements for the purchase of such bags if a sufficient number are interested. Branded bags will be discussed, connection with the sale of potatoes in branded bags will be discussed. Tentative arrangements have been made for the Eugene chamber of commerce to furnish a revolving fund to finance the handling of branded potato bags through the county agent, who will urge all potato growers who have potatoes to sell to attend this meeting.

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THE CITY ELECTION.

The Sentinel, in its last issue, offended Andrew Brund and some of his friends by its reference to the so-called Brund ticket. In that reference The Sentinel merely printed what was being said on the streets and was in no way expressing an opinion. A newspaper prints the news, it does not make it. However, the use of the word "so-called" inferred, and was meant to infer, that The Sentinel was not saying that the so-called Brund ticket was actually a Brund ticket. In fact, the use of the word "so-called" expressed a doubt.

The Sentinel sees no reason why this reference to Mr. Brund and some candidates should have offended anyone. Certainly there was no opprobrium included in the reference to men who have freely given their time heretofore in service and are willing to do so again. In case of their election much worse things are likely to be said of them unless their experience is different from that of this writer and others who have given their time in the service of the city.

The Sentinel has offered Mr. Brund whatever space he may require to correct any wrong impression that may have been created, but inasmuch as he has not taken advantage of that offer, The Sentinel takes pleasure in saying that Mr. Brund has stated it that he took no prominent part in bringing out any candidate except in his own ward, in fact was out of the city when the time for filings expired, that there certainly is no Brund ticket, so-called or otherwise, never has been and never will be, and that if a so-called Brund ticket was to be referred to other so-called tickets should have been referred to.

Serving the city in any capacity is a thankless job and those willing to serve should be commended for their willingness to give their time in exchange for the abuse that is their lot and the untruths that will be said about them. Certainly friendships should not be severed through mere candidacies for city office.

The Sentinel believes that each candidate for city office favors the most rigid economy in the conduct of city affairs. With them The Sentinel most heartily agrees. During the next several years city affairs must be so conducted that there will be a material reduction in city warrants and city bonds. In fact, rigid economy should prevail until such time as the city is practically out of debt, which is likely to be at least ten years at the rate of progress now being made. There is no reason that we know of why this cannot be accomplished. There is no prospect of need of any great expenditures. There is no excuse for a bond issue of any kind that would have to be paid by taxation and no immediate prospect of need of a bond issue for the water system or for streets. There is prospect of need of a bond issue of a few thousand dollars to refund Bancroft bonds, but that would not create new indebtedness.

During the past several years, especially during the past two years, splendid progress has been made in cutting city expenses. That record must be maintained for some time to come. The Sentinel does not believe it possible to practice much more rigid economy than is now being practiced, but it most certainly will oppose anything that carries threat of unnecessary expenditure of tax funds.

Our indebtedness must be cut, it must be wiped out. With each and every candidate pledged to this kind of a program the contest becomes one of personal popularity. Whoever the successful candidates may be, they will have the support of The Sentinel in a business-like, rigidly economical conduct of city affairs.

COTTAGE GROVE LOSES GAME AT NORTH BEND

Desperate Last Minute Struggle Fails to Change Score of 19 to 0.

North Bend defeated Cottage Grove 19-0 last Saturday at North Bend. The teams battled on equal terms throughout most of the game but at times Cottage Grove displayed a ragged band of offense with several fumbles and had many incomplete passes.

North Bend scored early in the second period when a pass knocked down by Stewart fell into a North Bend player's arms with a clear field ahead of him. The kick for the extra point was made.

HANDICAP TOURNAMENT IS TO START SUNDAY

Winner in First Flight Gets Cup Won by Leonard Last Year.

The Cottage Grove Golf club's annual handicap tournament will start Sunday. New handicaps have been set and are given on cards showing pairing which have been posted at the golf course. Players are to meet those with whom they are paired, but those unable to meet their opponents, if making no arrangement to play within a week's time will be considered to have forfeited the match. That rule will apply during the entire tournament. It is expected that five weeks will be required to complete the tournament.
