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HARMS CREEK SECTION SUFFERING FOR WATER

Green Pasture Is Scarce and Dairymen Are Feeding Stock.

Harms Creek, Oct. 5.—(Special.)—Old settlers are agreed that Harms creek is at its lowest stage in the history of the settlement.

Not enough rain to wet one's whistle in months and no green pasture for stock, so far as the upland ranges are concerned, stock must just as well be turned in on plowed ground, while bottom lands are badly in need of moisture.

A well known rancher and stock man was emphatic in expression yesterday that there would be no fall pasture this season to speak of.

Attention is called to the condition of stock in general, remarking that during all the years of his experience he had never seen stock at this time of year so poorly conditioned for the winter months.

Under ordinary conditions stock goes into November with little if any feeding. This year there was liberal feeding in September. Dairy cows have in many instances grown noticeably thin and have shrunken in milk production, notwithstanding that heavy feeding with mill feed and green garden production has been the rule.

This entire section has been enveloped in heavy smoke for two weeks owing to the many forest fires on the Harms river and in the mountains. The weather has been very warm, the temperature ranging from 90 to 95 degrees, the smoke oppressive, the sun obscured.
