NEW PROCESS TO START MINING IN OLD BOHEMIA

J. H. Boldon Comes Unexpectedly From Cleveland With Carload Machinery.

Specific Gravity Separator Process to Be Installed at Lead Crystal.

While miners and owners of properties in the Bohemia district, with the assistance of residents of Cottage Grove, were endeavoring to evolve some way of financing the installation of a method for saving the mineral values from the ore of the Bohemia district, came word that J. H. Boldon, resident of this city 17 years ago, was on his way here with a carload of machinery that would revolutionize the separation of minerals, that he would, without asking a cent of help from anyone, install a plant at the Lead-Crystal, where mining operations have been under way for two years. Mr. Boldon has since arrived and the carload of machinery is expected to reach here within a day or two. The portion to be installed at the Lead-Crystal will be rushed into the mining district to get it there ahead of snowfall so that operations can be started this fall and continue throughout the winter.

In addition to the machinery for the Lead-Crystal, which will arrive at the same time for the establishment of a laboratory plant here that will handle ore from any mine and will experiment with ore from various mines. The first run at this laboratory probably will be on a quantity of free milling ore which has been brought here from the Noonday mine and which was to have been shipped to a smelter.

Boldon and associates have contracted to handle 30,000 tons at the Lead-Crystal, where a million tons are already in sight. After this operation has proved successful and profitable, it is the plan to install other plants at other mines in the district.

COTTAGE GROVE FOUND FINANCIALLY SOUND

That Cottage Grove is in probably the best condition financially of any city of its size in the state and probably is in as good financial condition as any city in the state, was the statement made by Bert E. Haney, Portland, and E. C. Apperson, president of the U. S. National bank at McMinnville, who visited here this week to inspect the holders of Cottage Grove bonds.

The two men found that city warrants are being cashed at par and that every interest payment on bonds and every bond coupon has fallen due and has been paid, and that all except one issue of city bonds is being retired serially. The men were of the opinion that with a return of better financial conditions the larger part of the cities of the state will meet all their obligations promptly, but that the depression has brought about a realization on the part of both taxpayers and investors in bonds that there will result in more serious consideration being given hereafter to pledging the credit of taxing units.

Cameron Hearing Ends at Portland. Hearing on immigration charges against Rev. Duncan P. Cameron, pastor of the Presbyterian church here, were completed at Portland Monday. The hearing was conducted by Roy Norene, assistant district director of immigration, and was continued at the request of the defendant.

Briefs of the hearing are to be made and forwarded to the department of labor for a decision as to whether the minister shall be deported.

New Type of Paving Is Laid Here

One of the first experiments in Oregon with a new type of paving that is laid cold and solidifies almost immediately was made here this week by the Southern Pacific when it paved its Fourth street crossing. The new material is known as bituminous sand and is believed likely to revolutionize paving. It is produced in California.

In exchange for use of the city's road roller the railway gave the city a ton of the material, which will be used in repaving north Eighth street at the bus terminal where heavy vehicles have wrecked the light paving that was placed there before the days of heavy motor traffic.

LUMBER ASSOCIATIONS ARE CONSOLIDATED

Tariff on Softwood Gives 240,000 Days Employment in United States.

Seattle, Oct. 20.—Consolidation with the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association, with headquarters at Eugene, Ore., was announced here today by the West Coast Lumbermen's association. The new association, which will remain at the Eugene office as secretary, is the result of a recent \$4 tax and tariff applied by the United States on Canadian lumber, importation of soft wood lumber from Canada during September this year was about 30,000,000 feet less than in September, 1931, the West Coast association was informed today by the U. S. department of commerce. In September last year, Canada shipped 39,701,000 board feet of soft wood lumber into this country, while in the same month this year the figure was 8,740,000 feet.

In three months since the tariff became effective, the federal government reported shipments from Canada aggregated 30,199,000. From July to September, inclusive, 1931, shipments totaled 170,554,000. The association said that elimination of 40,000,000 feet of Canadian softwood lumber from the U. S. market is "equivalent to a gain of 240,000 days labor in American logging camps and mills during the period."

A. W. McGeorge Dies. Andrew W. McGeorge of San Pedro, Cal., former resident of Cottage Grove, died the last of the week at his home in California following a lingering illness. Funeral services were held at the Presbyterian church here Monday afternoon.

Mr. McGeorge was born in 1861 in Nova Scotia, Canada, and was 71 years of age. He lived in Maine, the early part of his life and moved to Wisconsin. He was married in 1892 to Jean Egan. The McGeorge family moved to Cottage Grove in 1927 and left for California about a year and a half ago.

Mr. McGeorge was a member of the Masonic fraternity and was a past master. He was also a member of the I. O. O. F. and K. P. While living in Cottage Grove Mr. McGeorge was a member of the official board of the Presbyterian church.

It had washed up and was covered with kelp weed, having the appearance of an ordinary stone until the weed was removed. COURAGE IS IMMEDIATE NEED OF LUMBERMEN

Trade Publication Believes Big Upswing Not Due Until First of Year.

(Crew's Lumber Digest.) The general outlook for the next 60 days is one which is going to call for considerable courage if manufacturers retain the advances they have made in prices since the middle of August.

What has happened to lumber recently has happened to practically all of the other major commodities. A careful study of building permits and other gauges by which the consumption of lumber is usually measured shows that purchases made during the spurt in buying which occurred in the early fall were not out of the market on a long-term basis. Any corresponding movement from the retail yards to the building job. No doubt many concerns, financially situated so that they could, figured it at least a safe time to lay in some stock, believing that when lumber was being sold for less than the cost of production it was improbable that it could so much if any lower, especially so since inventories at the mills were slowly being reduced so that the average operation would be out of the market on a long-term basis. The decision to buy was in all probability stimulated to some extent by an optimism in the stock market and the general spreading of optimistic reports regardless of who was responsible for the propaganda.

Looking the situation squarely in the face, for there is nothing to be gained by sidestepping any unpleasant facts, it is to be admitted that most of the lumber bought during the revival is still in the yards of the dealers in the consuming fields. With the winter months close at hand the added burden of the cost of the approaching season and the unfortunate state of business in general it does not seem reasonable to expect building programs of any consequence to get under way between now and the first of the year that will absorb any appreciable percentage of the footage which the dealers are now carrying.

The facts are, any far-reaching prosperity of the lumber industry depends not upon moving lumber from the mills to the retail yards for storage but upon the movement from the retail yards to the building jobs. It is to be expected that the early start of the coming year will see the beginning of a long upward swing which will bring as much benefit to lumber as to any other commodity.

No one can predict with any degree of certainty what will happen 90 days ahead, especially so with the complication of political uncertainties which the country is confronted but there is enough in the immediate sight to cause anyone to feel that it will be necessary to drift through the next 90 days with a minimum of business and with the mills will meet this with further curtailments. A foregone conclusion. Therefore, the outlook is for a lighter demand and a lighter output of lumber until the atmosphere now confronted has had time to clear.

One finger was severely frostbitten and a few minutes after he had extricated himself.

Hoover Has Never Employed Chinamen and Roosevelt Is Not Invalid.

Irresponsible and unworthy members of a spurious organization of war veterans have been circulating a printed sheet, called the Veterans News, for the sole purpose of defaming the president and the vice president of the United States.

It is sufficient answer to point out that during all the years that Herbert Hoover followed his profession of a mining engineer in foreign countries he carried passports as an American citizen. He could not have traveled from country to country without them, and he could not have obtained them without being an American citizen.

The second scurrilous charge is that Herbert Hoover employed only Chinese labor on his California ranch, and that he caused a sign to be put up warning white men to not apply for work.

Lumber orders decreased 6,951,000 feet from the previous week. Inventories increased 330,000 feet from the week ending October 8. New domestic cargo orders increased 1,354,000 feet.

A delegation of lumbermen planned to leave tonight for Chicago to attend a public hearing October 25 on application of the West Coast Lumbermen's association for a substantial reduction in east-bound lumber rates. The Western Pine association, Portland, and the California Redwood association, San Francisco, also have made similar applications.
