HARMS CREEK

Oct. 26.—Road Patrolman Joe McCargar for this section of Harms river has been doing some necessary work on the Harms creek road this week. The bridge across the water run near the Arthur Bales barn has been repaired, a culvert put in at the foot of the hill on the north and some general fill repair work on the hill. Down the creek at the VanValin dairy farm the fence has been repaired, giving a much easier turn in conformity with the bend of the creek and at the same time doing away with a blind corner. There also a culvert will be overhauled.

Arthur Bales is occupying some of his spare time this fall burning out many old stumps which had been left in a small field opposite his house when the ground was cleared for field purposes 40 years ago by his father. The trees evidently ranged in size from large second growth fir to four foot old growth. The field comprises an acre and a half of excellent garden ground. It probably is not far from fact to say that before the removal of these stumps one-twelfth of the soil of this small area was taken by them.

Across the canyon the other evening many stump fires were noticeable on the Lee Thomson ranch along the outside boundary of his strawberry field. It has been an exceptional fine fall for stump burning and cleaning up of new ground.
