## County Agent Has Big Year Aiding Farmers

Report Is Made on Assistance Given on Various Projects.

Continued promotion of interest in alfalfa growing and in better pastures for dairy cattle. Lane county farmers sowed approximately 1500 acres of alfalfa this year, bringing the total in the county to 4,300 acres. Orders were pooled for Lading clover seed, four held, and more than 100 acres of this pasture crop sowed. Two fields of stem-rot resistant sweet clover were certified for seed and a campaign started to interest growers in this pasture crop. Coast section farmers were assisted in buying Borfield turnip seed, this being an exceptional variety for the coast.

A plot of rust resistant Schoolman oats were grown near Irving as a start of a project for valley farmers to furnish seed of this variety to coast section farmers.

Fields of wheat, oats, potatoes and bent grass were inspected and passed for certification of seed of desired varieties. Two new varieties of potatoes were introduced for trial, a potato grading school was held, and plans started for the purchase and use of branded sacks in marketing Lane county potatoes. Weed control demonstrations were conducted and weed killers sold to farmers in pools at cost.

A four-year demonstration was started to show the influence of pruning on grade and yield of red cherries, burning demonstrations were held, peach thinning shown, and assistance given orchardists in the control of cherry

fruit-flies and root borers. Cover crop demonstrations were conducted and trials made of various fertilizers on these crops. New sections of strawberries were introduced from the Alaska and Oregon experiment stations to find better varieties for this county, two trials of fertilizers were conducted on strawberries, and a demonstration on strawberry insect control was conducted. A tour was conducted to study irrigation of truck crops; the use of electric hot-beds was discussed at a special meeting, a fertilizer for truck crops studied. The county home demonstration agent was assisted in carrying on a project for better home gardens.

Assistance in laying out irrigation systems was given 12 persons. Irrigation has increased rapidly in Lane county and this year 100 truck growers irrigated 800 acres of truck crops, while about as much more land was irrigated in the growing of other crops. Trials of fertilizers in growing pasture and root crops were conducted, and interest in the use of lime was promoted. The county agent tested 167 soil samples for 69 farmers to determine the lime requirements and assisted the operators of the Black Butte mine in developing their lime project. A soil short course was conducted.

A campaign against ground squirrels was carried on with the assistance of farm organization. In this campaign 6,300 pounds of poison baits were used, and squirrels were poisoned on 21,400 acres of neglected land by supervisors. Gopher and mole control was demonstrated and area gopher poisoning done on Goodpasture Island.

Chicken and turkey growers were assisted at meetings on brooding and rearing chicks and pouls and

at demonstrations and on tours. A special turkey institute was held. Four hundred cows were tested for production in 11 herds in the herd improvement association, dairymen were assisted on organization problems, tours were conducted to see better pastures for dairy cattle, dairymen were assisted in computing balanced rations, and a directory of breeders was maintained. Sheep growers were assisted at a special meeting on flock management problems.

The county court was assisted in planning for the production and conservation of garden crops and other food products by people needing assistance from the county, and help of farm organizations was enlisted in this work.

Ten colonies of parasitized earwig were brought to the county, the American Legion was assisted on their Oregon products campaign, a farmers week held and miscellaneous assistance given farmers and farm organizations.
