"One prince's chief extravagance has been dogs. He kept 700, every dog cared for by its own dog boy; over every 20 dog boys was a captain of dog boys, and over the whole a veterinary surgeon ranking as general. An electric fan whirled night and day above each dog, to keep off fleas."

That Frankish Urge to Do "Forbidden Things"

It is sometimes just as well, even for small boys, to temper obedience with discretion.

The other day an ingenious youngster was charged with giving a false alarm of fire. His defense was that the notice on the fire alarm said: "Break the glass," and that he followed instructions.

Blind obedience, however, is not normally a characteristic of human beings whatever age, and one of the things which sometimes tempt otherwise quite normal people to pull the communication cord on a train is the fact that they know they mustn't do it. Similarly, notices that a thing is "forbidden" often arouse a wild desire to do it—though there was no thought of it in your mind until you saw the notice.

Long Journey

Live in Hot Water
In the middle of Arabia, at Hufuf, there are hot springs in which small fish live their ordinary lives. If these fish are put into cold water they die, yet the water feels hot enough not only to kill fish, but to cook it! They are prettily colored fish, with bright, green backs, spotted with blue, yellow fins, and tails like silver with two or three black bands. No one knows how these fish came to live in this isolated desert oasis. Some hold that ancient Arabia, before the Dry Desert age began, was intersected by great deserts, and that oases, such as the one at Hufuf, are the only remains of these ancient highways.

New World's "Discovery"
Some historians of the Roman Catholic church are of the opinion that their missionaries reached the western hemisphere before the discovery of America by Columbus. They claim that documents from the Vatican archives, which were published in 1893, contained information concerning the diocese of Gardar, in Greenland. This first Catholic diocese in the New World was established about 1125 and had resident bishops until 1377. However, other historians claim that the church of San Nicholas, in Santo Domingo, which was founded by Governor Ovando in either 1502 or 1508, is the oldest Christian church in the New World.

Mixed Blood in Ireland
In the population of Ireland, three major types are usually recognized. The most primitive is the short, black-haired type, sometimes called Fihroib, variously defined by anthropologists as non-Aryan or Iberian or a branch of the Mediterranean race. The conquerors of these people were a tall and blond race known as Tuatha de Danann, who were either Scandinavian or Celtic-speaking peoples. They were followed by the Gaelic invasion probably within historic times. This Celtic speaking race is identified with the predominant type of Irish of the present day.—Washington Star.

Dieting Hint
If you want to have perfect teeth, you should, according to an expert, partake every day of two apples, a pint of orange juice, two bananas, at least one egg, lettuce, and two other kinds of vegetables, and up to four glasses of milk. He does not state what you should eat to support the other parts of the body.
