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Work of Demonstration Agent Is Described

Women of County Lay Out Program for Each Year's Work.

(The following report of the work of the county home demonstration agent was made at the recent session of the county chamber of commerce.)

The home extension office for Lane county, which is located in Eugene, is operated through a cooperative arrangement between the United States department of agriculture, the state of Oregon, and Lane county. Each is of equal importance. The government, through a special fund, furnishes the agent's salary and research service given through bulletins, etc. The state supplies the administrative setup, with specialists, bulletins, etc., and the county provides the office and its maintenance. The county's share of this is \$1,100. This is \$100 less than last and previous years, due to a voluntary request on the part of extension representatives. This office, in other terms, costs the taxpayers about 5 cents per year out of every \$100 in taxes.

Home extension work operates through a careful program planned each year. This program is made annually at a county homemakers' day when the women deliberately study their needs in adult education. This conference is arranged and directed by Lane county women. Mrs. Ralph Laird of Jasper was chairman last year and has been re-elected for this year. Chairman of the six units which meet during the day were: Mrs. Frank Harlow, foods and nutrition; Mrs. J. W. Maxwell (Irving), clothing and textiles; Mrs. Victor Bailey (Ivory Road), child development and parent education; Mrs. Clyde Wright (Creswell), organization and administration; Mrs. A. C. Miller (Junction), house and home management; and Mrs. H. H. Gunther (Eugene), recreation and dramatics. In each of these divisions leaders appointed by their community groups, come to a central place and

units are submitted to the entire conference for adoption. Every community is invited to send six delegates. Last year 30 communities were represented at this planning day. The territory of the county represented extended from the coast to Vida and from north of Junction City to Latham and Mosby creek.

It is no longer a question for deliberation as to the need and value of continuous education in every day. The fact that approximately 800 homemakers are enrolled in this work in Lane county and that these cooperators are from 45 communities suggests the scope of it.

Administration of home extension work throughout the year is by an executive committee of six women elected by the delegates at homemakers' day. No one may serve more than four consecutive years on this committee, which meets monthly. The present committee is: Mrs. Ralph Laird, Jasper, chairman; Mrs. J. W. Maxwell, Irving; Mrs. Clyde Wright, Creswell; Mrs. H. H. Gunther, Eugene; Mrs. J. A. Adkins, Alvador; Mrs. E. W. Ryan, Willakenzie.

The work is presented through projects. A project is a particular subject which is undertaken for study and usually includes from one to nine or ten meetings. These may be handled either through direct teaching by the agent or through training local leaders who handle them. One of the popular projects handled directly by the agent last year was economical meals, in which 20 communities participated. The women reported over 3500 changes in food habits from this project. Another project was that of the year-round vegetable garden work. This study was handled by the county agent and the home demonstration agent cooperatively. Two hundred men and women are enrolled in this work and it included among other things a garden tour, pest control service and preservation helps.

Parent education and recreation and dramatics offer examples of the local leadership type of project. In each of these divisions leaders appointed by their community groups, come to a central place and

subject matter material and the method of presenting it for the local group. At present 12 communities are represented in our parent education study course being given in Eugene.

The summer was given over—with the exception of vacation camp—to emergency work. The chief activity along this line was that of assisting in the preparation of the plan and the schedule for the portable cannery. This plan was written by the county agent and the home demonstration agent. It was adopted by the county agriculture council and the county court. The philosophy is that of self help. Approximately 25,000 cans of fruits and vegetables were canned during September and August—food that otherwise probably would have been wasted. Demonstrations of seven home evaporating driers were given and over 400 people called in person at the extension office to get help in preservation. Besides this the driers were on display at Cottage Grove, where over 50 called to see them. The grapes worked in cooperation with the agent in affecting much food preservation including the idea of drying aprons for emergency work. Commissioner Crowe secured the help of some unemployed men and 18,000 pounds, donated, were brought into the drier.
