LEBANON DEFEATS C. G. ARMISTICE DAY GAME

Locals Make One Threat With Pigskin on Visitors' One Yard Line.

Lebanon defeated Cottage Grove 27 to 9 in an Armistice day game here.

The teams were evenly matched except for passes. Lebanon scored two of her four touchdowns by this method.

Lebanon scored early in the first period, after Horst punt traveled only 20 yards, and an outside penalty put the ball on the Grove's 20-yard stripe. In four plays, with Keith of Lebanon doing most of the ball carrying, Lebanon pushed it over for a touchdown. A pass for extra point was incomplete.

Lebanon scored late in the second quarter on a pass from Keith to Hall, who caught it on the three-yard line and ran over for another six points. Keith placed-kicked the extra point, making the score 10-0 at the half.

Cottage Grove made its only threat to score early in the third period when a bad pass from the Lebanon center went out of bounds on the one-yard line.

The punt out was partially blocked by Powers of Lebanon, and traveled only to the 29-yard line, and was returned to the 11-yard line by Dusenberry. From there Cottage Grove tried to push it over but failed by inches to make a first down on the one-yard marker. Lebanon took the ball on downs and punted out of danger.

Lebanon scored again in the third period after Hall had intercepted Smith's pass and had galloped 51 yards, only to be downed by a beautiful tackle by Dusenberry, after a thrilling race down the field, to the 29-yard line. A 15-yard penalty set them back, but a pass counteracted that. Keith, on an off tackle smash, ran 19 yards for a touchdown. The kick for extra point was good.

Two features of the game were some long runs made by Horn of the Groves and Ward's long distance punt, one of which went 76 yards.

Sullivan and Powers were outstanding on defense for the Groves.
