A SURPRISING ECONOMY IN SUGAR.

Everyone knows how sugar just melts away in rhubarb. But not so many know of this new way of cooking rhubarb and serving it deliciously sweetened—but using only half the usual amount of sugar.

Here's a trick recipe well worth noting. It will not only save pennies—it will create a sweet, fresh-flavored sauce that you'll all enjoy. This is a filling for a rhubarb short cake, preferably made with a biscuit crust.

Take 4 cups rhubarb, cut in small pieces, 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 level teaspoon Rumford all phosphate baking powder, and 1 cup sugar. Note that it calls for only one cup of sugar instead of the usual two.

Peel the rhubarb, cut it into small pieces about an inch long. Cover with boiling water and allow to stand for a few moments. Then pour off the water and sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon. Add the baking powder. Cover again with water, using just enough to keep the rhubarb until tender. Since rhubarb itself contains such a large amount of water, very little water is needed in cooking. When you are ready to serve this spicy dessert, spread this filling between piping hot layers of biscuit crust.

You can have some of the filling left over to pour over the individual servings if desired.

The baking powder in the filling is the unusual ingredient. It's quite a new idea, and an excellent one. That half teaspoon of Rumford allows you to cut down the sugar quantity one half. Just try it—you'll be delighted with the result. Many other fruit sauces can be handled in similar fashion.

BUDGET FOR 1933 IS
ADOPTED HECTIC MEET

Warrant and Bonded Indebtedness Show Decrease During Past Year.

(From Wednesday's Daily.)
The city's 1933 budget, carrying items totaling \$33,955.80, compared with \$30,419 for this year, was adopted at a rather hectic session of the budget committee Thursday night of last week.

"Where are you going to get the money?" was the question frequently asked. While it was anticipated that expenses for the coming year will be considerably under those of this year, the amounts budgeted were kept high in order that decreased tax payments may produce enough to cover necessary expenditures.

The only items causing serious controversy were those inserted to care for salaries. A majority of the members of the committee favored inserting the items to give the incoming council an opportunity to properly conduct the affairs of the city, with the understanding that the amounts budgeted are not to be expended unless relieved.

The budget contemplates several salary slashes. The water superintendent and purchasing agent, who is also city engineer, already cut to \$150, is to be cut to \$125. Mr. Coiler, who fills these positions, said that he is ready to do his part to assist the city in meeting the present emergency. The janitor and recorder's assistant, who also is assistant in the water department, as well as chief fireman, already cut to \$80 is to be cut to \$65, and money for even that amount was not specifically provided in the budget. Chief of Police Pitcher, already cut to \$130, did not protest another cut to \$100. Night Officer Shaeffer, who has had no cut, did not protest a cut to \$85. The budget does not show a cut for the recorder-water collector, who now draws \$125. The salary for this position was cut from \$175 two years ago.

The general fund carries an item of \$2,100 for retirement of warrants, which is an increase from \$700. The city has received notice that its warrant indebtedness can not be increased if its warrants are to continue to pass at par.

The street fund carries an item of \$2,000 for retirement of Bancroft bonds and payment of interest thereon, which is a decrease from \$5,000 last year.

The bond and warrant interest fund totals \$11,877.50, which is an increase from \$9,380 for this year. All items were increased to care for tax delinquencies, the total added being \$2,700. This was considered necessary to avoid the possibility of default in bond payments.

Warrants outstanding have been reduced during the year from \$18,205.41 to \$16,822.85, a reduction of \$1,382.56. The remarkable reduction of \$2,202.77 was made in the water fund.

Bonded indebtedness has been reduced \$16,900 during the year.

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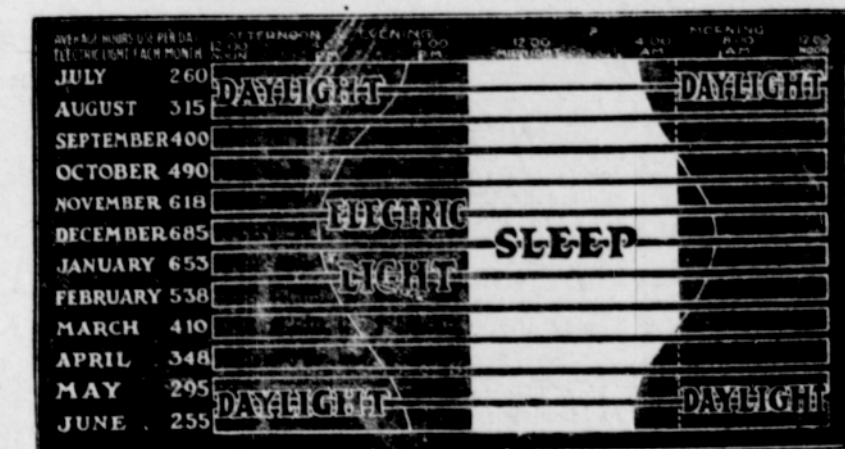
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WHY YOUR LIGHT BILLS
ARE HIGHER IN WINTER
THAN IN SUMMER

THIS CHART shows you at a glance why your electric bills are apt to be considerably higher in winter than in summer. The illustration has been prepared by the Society for Electrical Development and gives the number of artificial lighting hours, per day, for each month in the year. You will notice that the average use of electric light in a residence in December is the

neaviest of the year. In December the average use is nearly 7 hours a day, whereas, in June, the average is only 2.55 hours or 2 hours and 33 minutes.

In January, the daylight hours grow and the artificial lighting hours decrease. And this condition continues from month to month until we again reach the heavy days of June.
