Pilgrims' Journey Mount

St. Patrick Made Famous

One of the most unusual of all pilgrimages is that made annually to the mountain-top shrine of St. Patrick on the high, bare, cone-shaped mountain which bears his name and which overlooks Clew Bay, County Mayo, on the west coast of Ireland.

According to tradition it was from this mountain that St. Patrick drove all the serpents from Ireland into the sea.

The pilgrimage up the side of the holy mountain, where St. Patrick spent the 40 days of Lent in penance, fasting and prayer, 1,500 years ago, begins on Saturday evening any time between six o'clock and midnight.

Torchlights are carried by many to light the way and guard against precipitous falls. Often the crowd breaks into a hymn to make the walking easier or to help them to forget the difficulty of trudging over stony paths. For the climb up the last 200 yards before reaching the summit the pilgrims remove their shoes and finish the journey barefooted. Many of the more religious make the entire climb without foot protection.

St. Patrick was seventy years old when he first climbed the mountain. Now many a pilgrim of the same age makes the journey, taking a keen pride in this initiation of a part of the rigid Lenten penance of the patron saint of Ireland.

Devil Worshipers Must Not Mention His Name

A strange tribe of Yezidi "devil worshipers" has been discovered in the mountains of Iraq by Dr. Edmund A. Walsh, vice president of the Georgetown university.

"This tribe," he said, "worships the evil spirit under the name of 'Melek Taus,' symbolized by a bronze peacock, before which they offer incense, sing, dance and prostrate themselves. Their history goes back at least to the Seventh century.

"Their beliefs are contained in two sacred books which are preserved secretly somewhere in the mountains—the Book of Revelation and the Black Book.

"The Book of Revelation, which no foreigner has ever seen or been allowed to read, purporting to contain the personal instructions of Satan to his chosen people. One of the curious injunctions of his satanic majesty forbids the Yezidi ever to mention his name or even the syllables that compose it."

History in Roses' Names

Few people realize to what extent American history is reflected in the names of our roses. To begin with the name of our country, there is the America, a beautiful ruby-pink rose, and the Columbia, also rose-pink in color. Then there is the Francis Scott Key, a dark Trian rose-colored hybrid tea, named in honor of the writer of our national anthem. Many of our Presidents are also represented in the roll call of the roses.

Seven Continents

The land of the globe is sometimes divided into two continents, eastern and western; sometimes into four, Africa, Asia, Europe and America; more commonly into five, Australia being reckoned as one; still oftener into six, North and South America being counted separately; and since 1909 the land about the South pole—the Antarctic or Austral—has been counted as the seventh.

The county treasurer received \$7,279.80 Tuesday from the state treasurer as Lane county's share of forest reserve money. This fund is created by rentals of land within the national forests. A share of the rental fees are turned over to the state and are apportioned among the counties and Lane county receives more money from this fund than any other county in the state. Three-fourths of this money will be used for roads and the remainder for schools.
