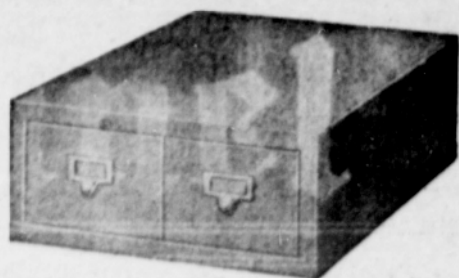
Famous Bust a Forgery
