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UNASSUMING EARL HILL.

In these days when most of us complain about giving our time and spending our money in performing civic duties, we wish to call attention to the performance of a citizen of Lane county whose services are so outstanding as to be worthy of comment. That person is Earl Hill, president of the Lane county chamber of commerce. The meetings cannot be held so far away from his home at Cushman and the roads can not be so bad as to keep him from being present. To come out into the valley for such a meeting means giving up the larger part of an afternoon and means getting home during the wee small hours after a long drive over the Florence to New York highway. Even before he was president Earl was present at practically every meeting.

We don't know all of Earl's civic activities, but he has been a member of the board of commissioners of the Port of Stiusaw for many years, probably ever since its organization, and he is also a school board member. Also he was a hard working and influential member of the last session of the legislature and will be there again the first of the year, and this job is a real expense to him. He attends to a general merchandise business at Cushman between times and also serves Uncle Sam as postmaster.

Despite all these honors, Earl is an unassuming fellow and might easily be taken for a country editor or a fellow who voted for Hoover. He pleads guilty to the latter.

It may be only coincidence but all three members of the legislature from Lane county are regular attendants at county chamber meetings. The other two are E. A. McCormack and Shy Huntington, who also have always been prominent in civic affairs.

What Club Women Do

Answer Is Made to Letter of Criticism Which Appeared in The Sentinel.

Cottage Grove, Ore., Dec. 14.—(To the Editor.)—May I be permitted

the use of your columns to relay information to the uninformed public in this community as to the activities of Cottage Grove society matrons?

In a recent issue of The Sentinel a letter, directed to the pleasure loving women of this city, appeared and suggested numerous ways for them to devote their time and energy toward helping the less fortunate of our community, especially the children. At the suggestion of many of these women, club sisters of mine, I write this letter.

We admit our sins, if finding pleasure and relaxation from the more serious and sordid phases of life in card playing can be classed as such. We do spend hours at cards or in social contact of various sorts, but we feel it helps us to carry on the necessary and sometimes unpleasant duties that face us as leaders in our community.

May I suggest that if the writer of the above mentioned letter, and perhaps other persons in our midst, would indulge in a bit of harmless recreation they might also be capable of seeing beyond their own doorsteps and might extend helping hands to suffering humanity.

I wish to state a few facts concerning projects which have been and are being sponsored by the frivolous and pleasure-mad club women of Cottage Grove. I feel safe in saying that the Keepers of the Den, an auxiliary to the Lions club, and the public health group are the leading groups in service work for the community. These are composed chiefly of society women, including doctors' and professors' wives and a number who have been denied the pleasure and joy of having children of their own, who were so slightly referred to in the previous letter. The Keepers of the Den are sponsoring the distribution of free milk to the undernourished school children who are unable to get it in their homes. This work was started three years ago by the public health group. Twenty-five children are receiving this benefit.

As an added responsibility, this same group is buying quantities of cod liver oil, amounting to many dollars, to be given to infants who are threatened with rickets. It would be fitting to add that it is partly through benefit teas and card parties given and attended by these club women that this has been made financially possible.

It has been through the untiring

and unselfish efforts of the public health group that school clinics have been conducted at regular intervals and that hundreds of children have received the benefit of medical treatment such as toxin anti-toxin for diphtheria, vaccination against smallpox and thyroid tablets as a preventative of goiter, through the public schools, both city and rural. The health group also maintains a loan closet for the needy where they may obtain sick room accessories and infant clothing on very short notice. Through the efforts of the county health officer and health nurse have made two visits to our city weekly to give free medical examinations and treatment for the children of our community.

The American Legion auxiliary recently conducted a Red Cross roll call in the city and is in receipt of a letter from the Lane county Red Cross executive secretary in which she compliments the women of Cottage Grove for the fine spirit, not only in their willingness to spend their time and effort in this project, but in every other project which was attempted in our community during the past year. It was only by the cooperation of the various clubs of the city that the auxiliary was able to conduct this drive for funds. Ten clubs responded to the call for solicitors with 24 women giving hours of their time. Of this number, ten are members of card clubs, and all but five of the 24 seemingly enjoy card playing.

A number of these worldly slickers, called club women, are actively connected with various church organizations and find time, and gladly give of it generously, for church work.

And let me not forget the teachers. Who, may I ask, does more for the children of our community, next to the parents, than the teachers? I have heard numerous cases cited where the teacher has given of both her time and money for the welfare of some unfortunate child. When I say time I mean outside of working hours. In the drive last year for funds for relief work the teachers gave approximately \$500 by personal subscription. A part of this was used for dental work on the teeth of school children who would have otherwise gone without.

It would be ridiculous for one to endeavor to list the duties and responsibilities of the ministers' wives in our midst. Surely each one of us knows and appreciates their worth to all.

Mr. Editor, I have failed to mention dozens of persons and organizations that go quietly on each day aiding and helping to bear the burdens of their fellow beings, but you know only too well what we do as you are always eager to list our activities in your publication and I must not take too much space to

reenumerate that which you have already mentioned in your columns on previous occasions.

May I say in closing that I was actively engaged in P. T. A. work in Eugene several years ago and agree with your "Interested one" that they are surely doing a good work for the children of their city. But I also state emphatically that the club women of Cottage Grove do as equally great a work for our boys and girls. So why organize

another group, whose duties would duplicate the projects of our present groups, and perhaps call upon these same women who perform these duties so willingly and well. I hope the general public will peruse your columns carefully in the future and read just what the social set of Cottage Grove is doing other than playing cards and engaging in pastimes of a lighter nature.
