REGAL THREATS AIMED AT MEIER

One-Time Backers of Governor
Now Enemies; Move not
Likely to Succeed.

State Capitol, Salem, Ore., Jan. 19.—(Special.)—The condition of the mind of the Meier family, as indicated by the repeated rumors of a recall movement against the governor, I can't be blamed for coming here, but would be opposed to a recall, while among those who talk of the danger of a recall are some of those who most vociferously espoused the Meier candidacy two years ago.

Such persons were the big noise of the free-power-for-nothing campaign and of other things which they believed they would secure if the wealthy friend of the people from Portland was put into the chief executive's chair. Little or nothing has been done to provide the free power and other things which these persons, probably erroneously, believed they were promised. I do not remember, however, that the astute big advertiser ever really definitely promised anything, not even that he would turn his salary back to the state.

Any way, one of these hydro-electric promoters said within the past few days that, unless hydro-electric legislation is forthcoming from this session, a recall move is likely to be started. I believe it was this same person who said that impeachment proceedings might be better. Neither movement would be likely to get anywhere, for the great majority believe the people spoke their desires two years ago and should take whatever they have coming to them. As Governor Meier has not done so bad, his trouble seems to be that his friends promised too much for him and led the people to believe that a recall candidate himself was doing the promising.

There is a distinct feeling here today that a hearing scheduled for tonight on the severance tax has been rushed along altogether too fast. This is only the first day of the second week and the bill was introduced on the previous day. Jack Magrady, J. H. Chambers and others from Lane county will want to be heard and it is doubtful whether they and other lumbermen over the state have been given sufficient notice to enable them to be here and make a suitable showing. Another or other hearings will certainly have to be held before the bill gets onto the calendar.

Members returning today from spending the week end at their homes find that there is a growing sentiment over the state for a sales tax spread thin enough not to injure anyone and which would be an offset against the property tax. This last feature is important. The folks at home are beginning to realize some of their fear and to realize that it is going to take this to relieve the property tax burden.

It has been pointed out that those who buy the more expensive items would pay the greater proportion of the tax, which would be hitting the poor the hardest. So far no effort has been made to decrease tax delinquency by returning to the one-cent-a-month penalty on delinquencies, and no effort has been made, and probably will not be made, to return exempt property to the tax rolls.

One way to greatly relieve the tax situation would be to charge a registration fee for those who come here seeking jobs, or the sessions might be entertaining enough to make it none too easy to charge a small admission fee.

FREEZE DAMAGES GRAIN HAY CROPS IN COUNTY

Very little fall sown grain and vetch is left in fields of Lane county farms as a result of the hard freeze early in December. While ground was unprotected by snow, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent. Some Hungarian vetch and Austrian winter pea fields are about half killed but the common variety of vetch, gray oats and wheat are practically 100 per cent ruined in most parts of the county, he said.

These fields will have to be re-sown if farmers expect to harvest any of these varieties of hay or grain. It was pointed out that farmers have no funds with which to buy seed and most of the seed all their seed for fall sowing there is a hard severity of the one in ground and the grain is protected.

J. H. LAW IS ARRESTED FOR RECKLESS DRIVING

J. H. Law was arrested Sunday evening by Chief of Police G. B. Pitcher on a charge of drunken and reckless driving after he had crashed into a parked car in front of the Humphrey & Mackin store. Three bottles of beer were found in his car.

Law pleaded not guilty to the charge Monday in Justice of the Peace J. E. Young's court. His trial was set for January 23 and he was allowed his freedom on \$100 bond.

According to Chief of Police Pitcher, Law drove his car into the rear of the Melvin Adams car, hitting it with such force that this car was driven into a car belonging to P. S. Bukowski parked in front of the Adams car. The Bukowski car was knocked about 20 feet. The rear end of the Adams car was damaged, the frame was sprung and a spring was broken. The Law car was badly damaged. The radiator being knocked in and the frame bent. The Bukowski car sustained only minor damage.

Law suffered a gashed nose when his glasses were broken in the crash.

This is the second charge of reckless driving that Law has faced. He was tried February 3, 1932, in local police court on a charge of careless and heedless operation of a motor car. He was acquitted after the jury had deliberated an hour.

I was in error the other day in stating that Mr. McCormack is clerk for her husband. For the information of the many who want to know whether members of the legislature are getting their trips home over week ends, it should be stated that no clerk or employee gets any mileage at any time, probably on the presumption that they should be ready to go to Salem. Members get mileage once only, on the presumption that they remain in Salem from the opening of the session until its close.

State Capitol, Salem, Ore., Jan. 16.—The technocrats say that a very brief period of work each day should be kept up, enabling any person to supply himself with the necessities and luxuries of life. To all appearances, so far as sessions are concerned, the legislators are the technocrats of the legislature.

"Is that all the work the members do in a day?" is a common query by those who do not know all the ins and outs of operating a legislature. Such persons don't know that the length of sessions doesn't have much to do with time given by members. They often are busy for an hour or two before sessions meeting constituents, being interviewed by lobbyists, who may be constituents from home, interviewing other members about legislation or business of the session, or possibly visiting departments or functions of the state to get information necessary for intelligent legislation.

State Capitol, Salem, Ore.—Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Lombard were here from Cottage Grove and were accompanied by Frank Porter of the same city. Mr. Lombard, who is city attorney of his home city, has been prominently mentioned in his home as a legislative material, but so far has not been attracted by the \$34-a-day job.

A five-minute preview the other morning for the opening of the house seemed to have little noticeable effect, but the minister realized that the members needed divine assistance and probably even that will not be able to please all the people at home.

A picture of members of the legislature of 1885 has been erected from the basement and hangs on the wall of the state treasurer's office. Members from Lane were R. M. Vatcher, E. P. Coleman, George B. Dorris, L. B. Lyle, A. D. Burton and R. B. Hayes.

A larger representation than the picture has, the new membership was 38, it is now 90. The picture does not designate who were senators and who were representatives.

Car License Sales Increase.

SCHOOL OF MINES
WANTED BY MINERS
New Organization Seeks Re-establishment at Oregon State College.

Re-establishment of an active bureau of mines and a school of mines at the state college were advocated by several hundred mining men from all parts of the state who gathered at the start of the session to perfect a permanent organization of the scattered units throughout the state. Robert M. Betts, of Eugene, president of the Black Butte quicksilver mine, was elected president of the new Oregon State Mining Congress and Berton K. Lawson of this city and Portland was elected vice president.

The purpose of the mining congress is to collect information relative to the nature and extent of the mining resources of the state and to assist in publicity to attract capital for development purposes. It was pointed out that there is no over-production of precious metals at present.

A legislative committee appointed by President Betts Monday is to meet soon to prepare measures to be presented to the state legislature. These bills will be prepared from the seven resolutions adopted by the mining congress.

These resolutions sought more prompt action on granting of permits, opposed severance between surface and sub-surface rights, favored exemption of gold production from income or intangibles taxes, urged re-nationalization of silver, endorsed a moratorium on annual assessments for work for the period 1933, urged a mining exhibit from this state at the world's fair in Chicago and urged repeal of the law known as the Laborer's and Material Men's Lien law.

LANE ASKS \$20,000 LOAN FROM R. F. C.

Money to Be Used on Secondary Road Program to Help Needy of County.

The county court has applied for a loan of \$20,000 from the federal Reconstruction Finance corporation. If the loan is approved, the county, with the money it can raise, locally, will be able to carry on a relief program this year which will care for practically all its needy.

Lane county joined with several other counties of the state and presented its request to the finance corporation through the governor's relief committee. County officials expect to hear soon from Paul V. Maris, secretary of the committee.

The loan would be paid back from secondary highways over a period of several years.

This \$20,000 would be used in a road program, according to Commissioner O. E. Crowe. It would probably be placed very largely on two secondary highway projects—the South Alder street road being built to Creswell and Cottage Grove and the Siuslaw road from Walton through Richardson to Swisswam.

William W. Everingham Dies.
William W. Everingham, 84, died here Sunday at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Cecil C. Woolley. Funeral services were held at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon in Eugene and interment was in the Resthaven memorial park there. Mr. E. E. Childers conducted the services.

Mr. Everingham was born March 22, 1850, in Zanesville, O. He lived in Missouri, Arkansas, Arizona and California before coming to Oregon in 1907.

Besides the daughter, surviving relatives include a son, George Everingham, and a brother, Luther Everingham of Alhambra, Cal.

Wedding Anniversary Observed.
