LANE CHAMBER HEARS LAWGIVERS' REPORTS

Lane Solons Declare State to Be Sound in Its Finances; Schools Hard Hit.

Stating that Oregon was financially sound, though temporarily embarrassed pending collection of incoming taxes and due to the difficulty of borrowing money, members of the Lane county legislative delegation laid bare the problems of statecraft to the members of the Lane county chamber of commerce at Junction City Friday night.

The picture of a legislature, confronted on all sides by seemingly insurmountable problems, buttoned at every hand by constituents seeking something for their particular districts, balked at every turn by economical pressure and finally submerged by an apparently unending flood of bills of every description, was drawn by Senator H. C. Wheeler and Representatives E. C. McCormack, Earl Hill and C. A. "Shy" Huntington at the meeting which was attended by approximately 100 persons from all parts of the county.

The meeting started with a turkey dinner at 6 o'clock followed by a program consisting of musical numbers by Herschel Davis, a welcoming speech by Jake Miller, mayor of Junction City, a response by Senator Wheeler and a talk on the recreational resources of Lane county by Mrs. Mary Miles which was illustrated by many beautiful paintings by C. J. Fulton, Eugene artist.

The plight of higher education in the state was presented vividly to the meeting by Senator Wheeler, chairman of the powerful ways and means committee of the senate, who reminded his hearers that "once a man is down, the tendency is to keep kicking him till he is badly worried."

"The people of this county, and residents of every section of the state, are vitally interested in higher education of Oregon," he stated. "Higher education has been cut 40 per cent already, a considerably larger cut than effected in any other branch of state government. It has been cut so deeply that it will be hard to hold sufficient appropriation to carry on the schools in the proper manner in the immediate future."

"There is no fighting between the different schools this year, all are working together for the common need in the face of an obvious disposition to cut below a reasonable amount."

Lane county delegation is working together with a solid front to hold higher education in the place where it belongs."

The veteran Lane legislator urged his hearers not to worry about reports that the state is headed toward financial reefs. Financially, the state is as sound as it was two years ago, but with tax collection the problem is to bridge the present time."

He came directly from five conferees with the state board of control and Portland bankers and I believe I can assure you the state is in no danger of financial collapse, he declared. "As you have tried to borrow money, bankers will not lend now without good security. Without the three mill state property tax, Oregon could not borrow one nickel because any other form of tax the legislature might impose would be subject to referendum and would be paid indefinitely. We have been threatened with referendum on any form of tax we may consider and the bankers know this and knowing it, will not loan on that basis of security. It is therefore necessary to have the property tax of three mills, not subject to a referendum, to offer the bankers as security."

The state will be able to borrow sufficient to tide it over the critical period, though we shall probably have to pay a higher rate of interest."

E. A. McCormack, chairman of the house committee on taxation and revenue, outlined the difficulties confronting the legislature in seeking some relief plan in the face of demands for relief from all sections of the state coincident with demands for reductions from all sections.

Fred Getchel asked the cooperation of the chamber in the move to secure lower telephone rates for rural and city service. The matter was referred to the legislative committee of the chamber.

ROAD PATROLMEN NAMED BY COURT

Road patrolmen for the county were named Tuesday by the county court. Twenty new appointments were made, several districts were combined for joint supervision and one district was abandoned. The patrolmen took office Wednesday, according to Commissioner O. E. Crowe. All will serve a \$2 a day reduction of \$1.10 from the \$3.60 wage of 1932.

Many district controversies arose this year in the campaigns of candidates for the posts and a number of delegations visited the county court in support of favorites.

Patrolmen for nearby districts include C. C. Conner of Siskiyou, who was reappointed for district 13 and who took the place of Tom Parks, Creswell, for district 21; Chaney L. Blosser, who replaced Ralph Lynch of Lorain for districts 56, 57 and 64; Joe McCargar, Cottage Grove, 15, reappointed; James Tedford, Cottage Grove, 16, 69, 76, reappointed; R. C. Gleason, Culp Creek, 17, reappointed.

Law Trial Again Postponed. The trial of J. H. Law on a charge of reckless and drunken driving, scheduled for Monday, was again postponed by Justice of the Peace J. E. Young because of the illness of Mrs. Bertha Gilmore, partner of Law in a cleaning business. Reliable sources of the trial is scheduled to be held Monday, February 6.

Scout Council Election Held. More than 200 persons crowded the banquet room of the Eugene chamber of commerce Saturday night for the annual meeting of the Willamette scout council, at which Dr. O. F. Stafford of the university was elected president of the council.

The gathering was one of the largest attended meetings associated with scout work and officers of the council and others connected with scouting were a unit in predicting a record in this field for the coming year.

Dr. Harold Axley was named as a member at large of the council. S. L. Mackin, representing troop 18 of this city, also was named on the council.

UMPUQUA FOREST GIVES EMPLOYMENT TO MANY

Records Show 483 Persons Employed During Summer; New Roads Built.

This is the season of year when the local Umpqua national forest personnel work statistical data dealing with the previous season's activities, makes innumerable reports of an informational nature, work up on matters of projects which should be undertaken for next season, and the like, according to Vernon V. Harpham, forest supervisor.

The record shows that during the past field season there was a total of 483 persons employed on the forest, the period of employment ranging from a few days to several months. Particularly, road and trail work was rotated to the fullest possible extent so as to give as many people employment as was consistently possible under the circumstances.

By way of illustration the south Umpqua district, with headquarters at Tiller, furnished employment for 197 persons during the month of September alone. Thirty-one of these workers were from the vicinity of Tiller, 11 from Drew, 36 from Milo and Days Creek, and 29 from all other sections of the county.

The Umpqua forest has 16 year-long employees. During the summer time there are 8 primary lookouts, 26 lookout-fires, 15 firemen, 4 protective assistants, 5 telephone operators, 3 packers, 1 administrative guard, 1 regular truck driver, a total of 64 protective helpers.

Work done during the past season included maintenance of 105 miles of road, 1374 miles of trails, 567 miles of telephone lines, 21 lookout houses, 20 headquarters buildings, 96 temporary station buildings, 25 miles of nature fences, 38 public camp grounds, and 45 shelters which are jointly used by the public and the forest service personnel. Next year this maintenance work will increase quite materially since new construction work last season included 19 miles of road, 72 miles of trails, 34 miles of telephone lines, 10 lookouts, 7 other buildings such as garages, and the like, 9 new horse pastures, a new ranger station water system aside from a number of projects of more or less minor importance.

Garden Club

"What it is?" asks an old Chinese, Lie-tchen, "that we seek in the pleasure of a garden?" It has always been agreed that these plantations should make men amends for living at a distance from what would be their more congenial and agreeable dwelling place—in the midst of nature, free and unrestrained."

No book is so popular this month, among gardeners, as the seed and nursery catalog. It is a book of romance, adventure, poetry and a practical guide for "how to be happy whether married or single."

The best time to prune flowering shrubs and shade and fruit trees is during the late winter and early spring, that is during late January, February, all of March, and early April, before growth begins. Pruning at this time stimulates new growth, the wounds heal quickly and you can see what you are doing so much better than after leaves appear.

Each year some new flower should be introduced into our gardens. It intensifies our joy in the garden to watch the growth and development of some novel plants and there is added pleasure in being the first in the neighborhood to grow it. "To the old be true, but do not be the last to accept the new."

There is a Japanese legend that in a time of great famine, the people were ordered to destroy all ornamental plants and devote their gardens to food plants only. But because the women were vain and believed they could not be beautiful without a face powder made from the iris and since they were forbidden to grow iris in gardens, they planted them on the house roofs.
