LANE MAY BE FORCED ONTO WARRANT BASIS

County Judge Fisk Attacks Tax Demands of State As too Big Burden.

Lane county finances will be forced from a cash to a warrant basis if the state persists in levying a three mill tax for state purposes and assuming the role of preferred creditor.

County Judge Fred Fisk said Saturday night in an attack upon the demands made by the state.

The state not only has announced its intention of standing by its demand for a three mill property tax, but under the legislative tax program will insist that the county pay the state its share regardless of whether the county receives sufficient funds from the taxpayers to pay the bill.

Lane's share of the state tax would be approximately \$245,000.

"On January 1 Lane county had an outstanding warrant indebtedness amounting to \$22,728.51," Judge Fisk said.

While the December bills amounted to \$42,660.54, making a total indebtedness of \$65,389.05 at that time.

"It is plain that the county cannot pay a state tax of \$245,000, carry the burden of all future tax delinquencies and keep from a warrant basis."

This state tax will make the 1933 taxes of Lane county as high as the 1932 taxes notwithstanding the drastic cuts made by the budget committee last December.

1932 there was no state tax. Under present laws the state will demand of each county its state tax in full regardless of what amount of taxes are paid into the county treasury by the taxpayers.

Judge Fisk declared that the state is striving to keep itself on a cash basis by passing the bulk of the tax to the counties and forcing them to register a large amount of warrants on which interest will have to be paid.

"It is no worse for the state to be on a warrant basis than to force the counties on a warrant basis and likewise force an increase of taxes on all real property of the state," he said.

"This procedure is exceedingly unfair. The state and every unit of government should stand its proportionate part of the tax delinquency. The state should demand a state tax at this time. Taxes should be reduced and there should be no preferred creditors on tax collections."

The legislative committee of the Association of County Judges and Commissioners of Oregon is working at Salem in an attempt to induce the legislators to allow the counties to pay the state tax on a percentage basis of tax collections rather than making the counties guarantee the whole tax in the face of delinquencies.

YAQUI JOE HAL COX TO WRESTLE FEB. 15

Famous Indian Matman Headliner on American Legion Benefit Card.

Yaqui Joe, savage Indian warrior from the Yaqui hills in Sonora, Mexico, is billed to meet Hal Cox, the Denver sensation, in a wrestling bout that promises to keep fans on their toes from start to finish.

This bout will headline the big benefit wrestling card which is being sponsored by the American Legion and will be held at 8:30 Wednesday night, February 15, in the armory, the match is for best two out of three falls with a two-hour time limit.

Proceeds of this card will go to the Legion for charity purposes and every Legionnaire in the city is out to boost this card to the very limit. They are determined that the largest crowd ever to see a wrestling bout in the city will be out to jam the armory to the rafters.

In order to have a real red hot, thrilling wrestling bout for the big card, the Legion secured Herb Owen as matchmaker.

Yaqui Joe, a chieftain of one of the Yaqui tribes, most fierce and warlike of all Indian tribes, is without doubt one of the greatest athletes in the wrestling game.

This Indian is a flying hold marvel, and his flying toe holds, flying body scissors, flying head scissors are wonderful to see and very dangerous to opponents. His legs, strengthened to the power of steel by long distance running are insured for \$10,000 and when they wind around an opponent in the ring few seldom escape from them. Yaqui Joe is tricky and clever like most of his race and to see him in action is indeed a treat. He has speed and is a sensational wrestler. When he is in a pin no expression crosses his features.

Hal Cox will give Yaqui Joe a battle to remember. Cox is very fast and clever. He is tough and mixes things furiously.

He is very strong and has been dealing his opponents plenty of misery. He has proven a sensation in Portland the last few cards.

REV. CAMERON FINED IN FEDERAL COURT

(Portland Oregonian.)
Rev. Duncan P. Cameron, Presbyterian minister at Cottage Grove, was fined \$250 Tuesday in federal court when he pleaded guilty to fraudulently representing himself to be a citizen of the United States.

Cameron was secretly indicted by the federal grand jury in July, the indictment charging that Cameron told the election registration office in Eugene that he had been born in Omaha. Cameron's birthplace, according to government records, is Ontario, Canada, and he is not a naturalized American citizen.

Rev. Mr. Cameron was arrested for deportation in May, 1932, by federal immigration officials on the charge that he had been convicted of a crime involving moral turpitude before entering the United States. Hearings before R. P. Engh, district immigration director, and Roy Norene, assistant, have been completed and any further steps toward deportation of the minister await action taken by Washington, D. C., on reports submitted by the Portland office. Cameron served time in the Saskatchewan jail for forging and passing a check. It is alleged he came to the United States from Canada May 28, 1926.

Charges in the indictment were presented before Federal Judge McNary by Assistant United States Attorney McCulloch. Cameron stated in his own behalf that he was acting under what he considered competent advice when he mis-stated the place of his birth. He was ordered to pay his fine at the rate of \$25 at once and the balance at \$25 per month.

Cameron has been popular in Cottage Grove and the surrounding territory as a public speaker. He served two years as chaplain of the state department of the American Legion.
