signs of intoxication but that he did seem tired. She had advised him to take a rest before starting back to Eugene.

Lawrence E. Carr, brother of John Carr, declared that Law was sober, that there had been no drinking, that Law did not fall down and that he did not see anything wrong. His testimony was in direct refutation of that of his brother. Mary M. Johnson's testimony confirmed that of Lawrence Carr but she said she was unable to confirm Law's statement that a car swerved out and crowded him into the curb because she was in the back seat and could not see. Under cross examination she admitted that she worked in Law's cleaning establishment that she and Lawrence Carr were considering buying Law's cleaning business.

District Attorney Brooke gave only a brief summary to the jury, urging them to consider the evidence. He declared that he did not want a conviction unless the jury was sure that Law was guilty. He mentioned that much conflicting testimony had been presented and urged that the jury weigh the facts carefully.

In his summary Brownell declared that the burden of proof was on the state and that the charge must be proved beyond any reasonable doubt and said that the state had not so proved the charge. He asserted that he wouldn't convict a yellow dog on the evidence presented by the state.

The case was given to the jury at 3:30. The verdict of guilty was brought in unanimously on the first ballot after about a half hour's deliberation.
