Early Garden Making Discussed at Meeting

Hotbeds and early preparations for garden making were discussed at an agricultural meeting held Tuesday night at the Silk creek school house. A fair-sized number were in attendance.

The question of how to live at home is an important one for all farmers at the present time, it was pointed out, the best plan being to utilize as many of the products grown at home, rather than merely growing cash crops and then buying the living. Superior storage of home grown vegetables also will result in a greatly reduced cost of living, it was stated. Few root and fruit cellars are seen in this part of the country and when a one recently experienced, a large amount of food is lost.

Another meeting will be held at 7:30 Tuesday evening at the same place. The meetings are offered by the department of vocational education of Cottage Grove high school as a special community service and are free to all interested.

DEMOCRATS ARE READY FOR POLITICAL PLUMS

Cottage Grove, Oakridge, Westfir Postmasterships Eyed by Party Workers.

With the near approach of March 4, inauguration day, and its attendant rise to power of the democrats, Lane county leaders and others of the party are looking forward keenly to the dropping of the first plum.

The terms of three postmasterships holding places that are rather attractive will expire right after March 4 and democratic party workers expect to see the republicans incumbents of these places changed for democrats. The postmastership at Cottage Grove paying \$2200 a year, that at Oakridge with a salary of \$1500 and the one at Westfir with a \$1200 annual stipend will be fair targets for the democrats.

C. C. Cruzon, Peter E. Nelson, Dale Wyatt, F. E. Mendenhall and N. E. Glass are mentioned as candidates for the local postmastership.

Judging by discussion among the party chieftains there may be some complications at Oakridge as Mrs. Sadie B. Jones, incumbent, is a democrat and may be endorsed for another term. Thus far there has been little in the way of any move among democrats for the Oakridge and Westfir postmasterships.

Public announcement of James A. Farley, rumored strongly as being slated for the place of postmaster general in the Roosevelt cabinet, that all democratic patronage would be exclusively for loyal and active party adherents, would seem to indicate that appointments would be restricted to the members of the party who have devoted faithful and constant service to the organization.

There is also considerable interest evinced here toward the movement among some of the national democratic party leaders to "liberalize" the civil service rules. This, as it is interpreted, would throw open to patronage many other federal positions which are now in the civil service classification.

1933 ROBOT CONTROL PROGRAM IS OUTLINED

The robot control program for Lane county to be carried out during 1933 has been outlined by a committee in school district No. 1, which includes Carl Gimp and Virgil L. Eassey with O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent, and J. F. Branson, assistant state robot control supervisor.

The program follows: Ground squirrels.—1. Carry on intensive campaign against gray ground squirrels in all parts of the county. 2. Ask farm organizations to nominate one robot control supervisor in each district.

Beaver.—1. Discontinue information on the control of beaver by the organizations. 2. Ask farm organizations to nominate one robot control supervisor in each district.

Pocket Gophers.—1. Conduct two gopher control demonstrations on an area basis. 2. Conduct two smaller demonstrations on methods of poisoning gophers.

Rats.—1. Assist farmers on rat control problem by disseminating information on various control measures. 2. Promote interest in showing rat control films at grange and other meetings. 3. Recommend poisoning with powdered red squill and gassing with calcium cyanide dust.

Jack Rabbits.—1. Disseminate information on the control of jack rabbits and conduct demonstrations on methods of poisoning same where necessary.

S. P. TO HELP KIDS SEE OLD IRONSIDES

To enable school children, their teachers and parents to see the U. S. S. Constitution, "Old Ironsides," at the time of its scheduled exhibition in Portland, May 10 to 22, Southern Pacific will name a special trip for school children and one cent per mile for teachers and parents, according to an announcement by J. A. Ormandy, passenger traffic manager, Portland.

ATTENTION DIRECTED TO FLOOD CONTROL

Emphasis on improvement of the upper Willamette river probably will be shifted from canalization to flood control for the present with efforts directed toward securing federal appropriation for surveys on flood control work, it was announced last week in Eugene.

Members of the Willamette River Flood Control association met last week with Lieutenant D. A. Newcomer and J. J. Hinish, engineers from the army bureau in Portland, for the purpose of discussing federal aid for the project.

The engineers informed the group of 60 farmers and others interested in the matter that so far no federal aid was in sight. Word that \$150,000 had been appropriated by congress was dismissed by the engineers who said no such information had been received at their Portland office.

F. K. Gallagher, Santa Clara, president of the association, named a committee of four men to prepare a resolution to be directed to congress asking a federal survey for flood control. The resolution will ask the Oregon delegation in congress to work for federal aid in the matter.

The Portland engineers indicated at the meeting that the cost of flood control work on the Willamette would be such magnitude as to be uneconomical. Local men countered this statement with the view that recent floods had done untold damage all along the Willamette river and future floods would continue their ravages, destroying considerable land if some thing was not done. Shifting of the stream's channel is estimated to have caused \$185,000 damage.

Meanwhile the Willamette Waters association, headed by Joseph Koike of Eugene, continued plans for a meeting at which the engineers' adverse report on canalization will be studied and future plans worked out.

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
