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THE DRIFT OF HUMANITY.
To the Editor: Since the end of the World War, the drift of the people of the United States has been forward, but it has been the reverse, especially the churches. To my mind the church is facing the worst crisis in its entire history. Faith in the inspired word of God is being destroyed, not by attacks from the outside, but by those who occupy the positions of trust in the churches.

The poisonous influence of such errors as higher education, higher criticism, modernism and the erroneous doctrine of evolution are leading the people away from the great fundamental truths of the scriptures. The tendency of these theories is to lead people to trust in man-made systems instead of in God and the plan He has ordained for the salvation of the human race. There was a time when the church was compelled to defend itself from attacks by infidels, atheists and agnostics. But now the situation has changed. The enemy is inside the church and entrenched in positions of influence, such as the pulpit, the theological seminaries and the publishing houses of the churches. Having this advantage, they make their diabolical attacks against the inspired word of God and its teachings. This is a new apostasy, poisoning the very life springs of the church. While professing to be its friends they are its most deadly enemy. So, like its divine master, the church is being wounded in the house of its friends.

So the call today should be from pulpit and pew for a return to the primitive faith of the Bible. The cry should be back to the old paths of ancient truths. The great need is for a Christian faith and experience founded on the Bible and based on a personal connection with our Lord and Saviour, Jesus the Christ, the only door to the Father and into the kingdom of heaven.

Now, if you will read the first chapter of Genesis and the first chapter of St. John's gospel, you will see that there is no theory in the Bible but just a plain statement of facts how God proceeded in the creation, not so the evolution. It is just a theory of a very weak brain of man. A theory, Webster says, is speculation; hypothesis to explain something; and a theory, Webster says, is speculation which terminates in speculation without a view to practice.

The word of God says, "Now the spirit speaks expressly by the latter times some shall depart from the faith giving heed to seducing spirits and doctrines of devils; speaking in hypocrisy in having their conscience seared with hot iron. Also perilous times shall come. Men also shall be traitors, heavy minded, blinded, hating the word of God, having a form of Godliness, but denying the power thereof; from such turn away." That scripture fits these times, and there is good advice.

CASCADE TRAINS ROUTED OVER OLD SHASTA LINE
